

Cathedral notes



2016 Issue 5 July/August

I was ordained in Bloemfontein, one of the most land-locked cities of South Africa and about 600km from the closest port. Right in the middle of the city is "Naval Hill", named after the ships' guns that were hauled up there during the 2nd Anglo-Boer War. What did seem a little odd was that the bishop was the liaison bishop for the Missions to Seamen (now Seafarers)! But it meant that every 2nd Sunday of July we faithfully kept Sea Sunday.

Exactly 160 years ago the Rev'd John Ashley was among those who founded the mission. Having visited a phenomenal 14,000 and more ships in his ministry, he was well aware of the unique needs, trials and difficulties of those who went down to the sea. The Mission to Seafarers grew from humble beginnings (in the Bristol Channel) to an international Christian ministry active throughout the world. I've had the privilege of getting to know a number of chaplains over the years, and theirs is a unique, challenging, rewarding and ever changing ministry.

To my surprise Adelaide seems generally unaware of Sea Sunday and to my knowledge the famous

Be that as it may, it seems worth spending some time thinking about, and praying for, those who sail the seas – as crew on the giant tankers, container ships and super cruise liners which criss-cross the oceans; those who make a living from fishing, or ferrying cars and people to Kangaroo Island; those who patrol our shores or are sent into the 'hotspots' of the world as part of the Royal Australian Navy; those who endanger their own lives to save others – the members of the South

Australian Sea Rescue Squadron for example; and of course, the many people who simply enjoy being on the ocean – in boats large and small.

I once met the Archbishop of the Indian Ocean. Unlike Australia with its vast tracts of dry red earth which makes up much of our rural dioceses, Archbishop Chang Him used small boats to get to visit his congregations and dioceses. On one occasion, he told us, the boat capsized, leaving people struggling together in the shark-infested water. When he commented to the captain that they had been lucky there had been no attack he was told "Did you not see the dolphins circling between us and the sharks?" That story reminds me of some of St Paul's travels and dangerous sea journeys (look for them in Acts). New Zealand hymn writer Shirley Murray picked up the many stories of dolphins rescuing humans in her hymn "Where the road runs out" - be the sailors' friend, be the dolphin Christ.

Mission to Seafarers' Chaplains play an important role in the well-being of the estimated 1.5 million professional seafarers, whose contracts can be very long, leaving them lonely, bored, far from home and open to abuse and exploitation. Life at sea remains a dangerous one. Mission chaplains are quick to respond to emergency and deal with seafarers who have been injured, taken ill or bereaved. They also, of course, offer opportunities for prayer, worship and receiving the sacraments.

As we know only too well, and tragically, there are other people who take to the sea in perilous conditions.

I am thinking of the 'boat people' – those desperate to leave their home countries and in search of sanctuary and a better



life. Australia's harsh policies, and almost complete media blackout on boats coming to these shores, surely adds to their already distressed state. What a good example our State Governor is of someone who, offered the chance, took it with both hands and continues to repay the generous hospitality of a previous generation.

"They that go down to the sea in ships ... have seen the works of God ... they reel and stagger like drunkards ... they cried to the Lord in their distress and he took them out of their trouble." Psalm 107: 23 - 32




By now readers of Cathedral Notes will be aware that our Archbishop retires on 19 August this year.
