Our beautiful, fragile world

I write this on the 1st September, the first official day of spring and a day of ecumenical focus on prayer for creation. Anglican, Roman Catholic and Orthodox Christians are being asked to use the month of September, leading up to the feast of St Francis of Assisi on 4 October, as a Season of Creation, with special prayers not only for creation but for a greater awareness of the fragility of the world in which we live.

The environmental co-ordinator of the Anglican Church in Southern Africa, the Revd Dr Rachel Mash, is a member of the Anglican Communion Environmental Network (ACEN) steering committee. "God's garden planet is being broken and devastated. After decades of pumping carbon pollution into the atmosphere, we are reaping the whirlwind," she said in an allusion to Hosea 8:7. "The most vulnerable societies on earth are facing devastating storms, droughts and flooding as a result of our misuse of God's wonderful world."

How did this happen?

Some say it is the fault of our reading of the Book of Genesis and two apparently conflicting verses. Genesis 1 and Genesis 2 offer different 'takes' on the creation story. Genesis 1: 26 reads

Then God said, Let us make humankind in our image, according to our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the wild animals of the earth, and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth.

And humankind has done this 'dominion' thing very successfully. So successfully, that we have wiped out innumerable species of plant, animal, fish and bird.

Genesis 2: 15 suggests something different

The LORD God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to till it and keep it.

Here the focus is on the care of creation, the careful stewardship of that which is entrusted by the Creator to the man-creature. The Hebrew word for earth is *adama*; Adam is simply a creature of dust, made from the earth.

This year we have invited Graeme Garret and Jan Morgan to spend some time at the Cathedral as the 2016 "Theologians in Residence". They will offer a quiet day, preach on Sunday morning, and lead the Monday Bible Study Group on the theme "The Earth is the Lord's: Listening for God in Scripture and Creation". You will find more details on p3.

Planned giving as stewardship

We have been blessed with a glorious Cathedral, an iconic sacred space looking out over the parklands to Adelaide City, with rich and varied programmes of worship, education, hospitality and outreach. This month I invite you to contribute to the good stewardship of the resources for which we have responsibility. Among other things this means ensuring there is enough money coming in month by month to pay for all the items on our annual budget. These include providing excellent music in our worship, ensuring the Cathedral itself and the other buildings are well maintained, offering appropriate pastoral care and paying the salaries and stipends of those on the payroll. At each of the Sunday services in September, leaflets will be distributed. While there is specific fund-raising going on for the restoration of the organ it is very important that our regular monthly income does not fall off.

Anglicans sometimes seem embarrassed by talking about money. We tend to avoid absolute directives such as the (Biblical) tithe. Yet, for our churches to remain open we need regular committed giving from all members of our communities. Christine and I make a monthly payment directly from our bank account to the Cathedral. On Sundays Christine picks up a card from the entrance table and puts it into the collection bags — a weekly reminder of our commitment. How much do we give? The equivalent of a daily cup of coffee and muffin each. It's not a

tithe, but it is a percentage of our income. It works for us.


My grandmother frequently quoted the old expression, "look after the pennies and the pounds will take care of themselves" — not a bad saying whether applied to money or creation.





Our *Green* Cathedral?

Some years ago St Peter's Cathedral made a conscious decision to explore becoming more 'green'.

What has happened since then?

The really big initiative – to capture water from the Cathedral roof and channel it into wetlands was over-run by the Adelaide Oval development. However:

- Solar panels, installed on the CP Hall roof, provide much of the power in the Cathedral Office.
- LED lighting was installed in the Lady Chapel.
- Paper is recycled.
- Bottles and cans are collected by the Friends and the profits ploughed back into the Cathedral.

Not much perhaps – but better than nothing. We each need to do our bit.

We thank you, God of all loveliness, for the beauty of the earth and sky and sea; for the richness of mountains, deserts and rivers; for the songs of birds and the beauty of flowers. We praise you for these good gifts, and pray that we may guard your heritage, to the honour and glory of your name. Amen.

Listening for God in Scripture and Creation

We live in a time of increasing awareness and anxiety about the Earth in which we live. About this island continent, Australia. About this beautiful place, Adelaide. Our attention is roused in part because of changes which are taking place around us.

Wild bushfires.
