Welcome: Welcome to St Peter's Cathedral this morning. Our cathedral is awash with scaffolding, scaffolding which heralds the return of our organ. The organ and the builders from Harrison and Harrisons are arriving and the work of rebuilding is about to begin. May we find what we see before us a sign of hope. The organ restoration project is our project, a project that has been supported in financial and practical and prayerful ways by our whole community. We have claimed again our identity as a place in the city of churches where God is known and loved in many ways and especially in music. And this morning we welcome as our guest conductor Roger Sayer, Organist and Director of Music at the Temple Church, London, who has led workshops with the Cathedral Choir this weekend.

We will read this morning from Chapter 6 of John's Gospel. This chapter is all about bread. "I am the bread of life," Jesus says. Jesus feeds a crowd miraculously with bread and fish and then the rest of the chapter is spent telling the story of his conversation with the crowd and the disciples exploring what this miraculous feeding means. As we gather in our cathedral this morning, we hear Jesus inviting us to ponder the truth that our faith matters as much as the most basic physical things that sustain our life. As we reach out our hands for the bread of life which we know in the sacrament of Holy Communion, may we give thanks for the faith that we know in word and music and in the company of one another, the Body of Christ.

First Reading: 2 Samuel 18:5-9, 14, 31-33 (Read by Francis Brooks)

The king gave orders to Joab and Abishai and Ittai, saying, 'Deal gently for my sake with the young man Absalom.' And all the people heard when the king gave orders to all the commanders concerning Absalom.

So the army went out into the field against Israel; and the battle was fought in the forest of Ephraim. The men of Israel were defeated there by the servants of David, and the slaughter there was great on that day, twenty thousand men.

The battle spread over the face of all the country; and the forest claimed more victims that day than the sword. Absalom happened to meet the servants of David. Absalom was riding on his mule, and the mule went under the thick branches of a great oak. His head caught fast in the oak, and he was left hanging between heaven and earth, while the mule that was under him went on. Joab said, 'I will not waste time like this with you.' He took three spears in his hand, and thrust them into the heart of Absalom, while he was still alive in the oak.

Then the Cushite came to King David; and the Cushite said, 'Good tidings for my lord the king! For the Lord has vindicated you this day, delivering you from the power of all who rose up against you.' The king said to the Cushite, 'Is it well with the young man Absalom?' The Cushite answered, 'May the enemies of my lord the king, and all who rise up to do you harm, be like that young man.'

The king was deeply moved, and went up to the chamber over the gate, and wept; and as he went, he said, 'O my son Absalom, my son, my son Absalom!

Would that I had died instead of you, O Absalom, my son, my son!'

New Testament Reading: Ephesians 4.25 - 5.2 (Read by Pauline Brooks)

So then, putting away falsehood, let all of us speak the truth to our neighbours, for we are members of one another. Be angry but do not sin; do not let the sun go down on your anger, and do not make room for the devil. Thieves must give up stealing; rather let them labour and work honestly with their own hands, so as to have something to share with the needy. Let no evil talk come out of your mouths, but only what is useful for building up, as there is need, so that your words may give grace to those who hear. And do not grieve the Holy Spirit of God, with which you were marked with a seal for the day of redemption. Put away from you all bitterness and wrath and anger and wrangling and slander, together with all malice, and be kind to one another, tender-hearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ has forgiven you. Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children, and live in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God.

We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.


