RAYING FOR PEACE

Our new Cathedral souvenir book (available now in the Shop and an ideal gift for early Christmas presents) has the title, "A Sacred Space." Of course all churches are sacred spaces, but one of the unique features of cathedrals throughout the world is that they tend to offer this sacred space to the wider community. All manner of people find themselves drawn into these places of sacredness to pause, to pray, to be. St Peter's Cathedral is no different. It is a place of community celebration and lament. Each day opens with the opportunity to gather as God's people to share in the

Eucharist. Each Wednesday evening a handful of people join the choir for Evensong to pray for peace in the world.

Thursday 21 September is designated by the United Nations as International Day of Peace. The whole day has been set aside for prayers for peace in our Cathedral. The invitation to a number of church-related groups to lead prayers and reflections on

the hour has been readily accepted. I am delighted that so many people see the Cathedral as "our Cathedral" and are prepared to come into its sacred space for this holy task. Come, if you are able, and spend time praying for those parts of the world where there is no peace, and giving thanks for the blessings of peace we so easily take for granted.

A special order of service has been crafted for 7pm that evening and will include music by Certaine Notes Choir and solo viola (Cecily Satchell). Lay Canon Rob Croser and the Independent Theatre Company will perform readings and recitations on the theme of Peace. Prayers will be offered from a range of different faiths. As part of our prayers we will all have the opportunity to light candles—after all, "It is better to light a candle than to curse the darkness". Well aware of the importance of praying for peace in our world, His Excellency the Governor of South Australia will be in attendance.

ILGRIMAGE FOR PEACE

One of the world's countries that continues to struggle to find peace is South Africa. Sixteen pilgrims, most from St Peter's Cathedral, will spend three weeks during September visiting the 'rainbow nation'. As well as enjoying the sheer beauty and variety of the geography, topography and animal life, the visitors will be introduced to a cross-section of its history, languages and peoples. Visits to the Apartheid Museum in Johannesburg, the Boer War concentration camp cemetery in Irene, the 1820 Settlers Monument in Grahamstown, and the Castle and Robben Island in

Cape Town will give snapshots of the history of conquest and oppression, and the struggles for freedom in different eras.

Over three days in Kwazulu/Natal the pilgrims will be guests of the Parish of the Ascension, Hilton. This visit will include seeing both some of the most expensive (in the sense of private and independent) schools and some of the poorest in the area.

Those familiar with Alan Paton's "Cry the Beloved Country" will recognise the Valley of the Thousand Hills, home to the Bongikosi and Sweetwaters self-help projects (thank you to Cathedral parishioners for donations of warm beanies and scarves which will be given as gifts for these desperately poor people).

Later in the tour, time spent at a Benedictine Monastery in the East Cape and Eucharist at St George's (Desmond Tutu's) Cathedral in Cape Town will remind pilgrims of the common faith we share in Christ.

To those travelling we say: Hamba Kahle (Go well - Zulu); to those remaining in Adelaide we say:

Sala Hantle (Stay well - Sotho).

Of faith and finding our way through life's issues

Within the Anglican church as with the general community there is a wide range of opinion about whether or not the definition of marriage should be changed in the Marriage Act. Some people are opposed to a change and some are very much in favour. In 2004 the General Synod of the Anglican Church of Australia welcomed the initiative of the Federal Parliament in clarifying that marriage, at law in Australia, is the union of a man and a woman to the exclusion of all others, voluntarily entered into for life.

Of particular concern in any debate concerning a change in the definition of marriage is that we are not talking only about an idea but we are talking about real people with real lives and this is the case across the spectrum of opinion. We have a responsibility to do all we can to ensure that the views of all are respected and heard and avoid any kind of bullying or coercion as the debate continues.

If the definition of marriage is changed widespread protections will need to be carefully put in place to protect the right of all Australians to hold and live out religious beliefs including those concerning marriage. This includes faith based organisations as well as individuals.



My hope is that Adelaide Anglicans whether they are for or against a change in the definition of marriage will participate in the debate in a way which is a blessing to those around them and will ensure Adelaide Anglican churches are a welcoming place for all.

and what and how to vote in a referendum that has no power other than moral, your faith and mine will be put to the test – for there is no easy answer. Much will depend on our understanding of what it means to follow the Living One, how we read and interpret the Bible, and how well we are able to enter into genuine debate, with a real desire to use both ears to listen and, perhaps often, keep our mouths shut. I am thankful, in a way, that as a resident alien I do not have a vote. But equally aware that the land of my citizenship has already voted on the issue of same sex marriage and the sky has not fallen.

We live in a complex beautiful world where there are many models of relationships. And we worship as part of the Anglican Church which has a long and proud history of being open to people, of working hard at holding together as family despite differences. We also belong to a church which has very definite views on marriage as that between a man and a woman together for life. Priests and deans are not at liberty to make changes to the formularies of the church while holding a bishop's licence.

When we come to kneel at the altar rail to receive the blessed sacrament of the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ,

we do so knowing that Jesus died for all people, Jew and Gentile, male and female, black and white, gay and straight. In Genesis the rainbow is a symbol of God's covenant never again to destroy the earth. While it has new connotations now, it remains a powerful reminder of God's love for the earth, the whole of creation, including every single human being. A tall order for us, but surely not for God.

First in Australia

The Right Reverend Kay Goldsworthy AO, has been elected as archbishop of WA—the first female archbishop in Australia. Bishop Kay is no stranger to the title of 'first', having been consecrated the first female bishop in the Australian Anglican Church in 2008, when she was



appointed assistant bishop of Perth. Also among the first Australian women ordained deacon (in 1986) and priested (in 1992), she has been Bishop of Gippsland since 2015

Appointed to the Order of Australia earlier this year, Bishop Kay was recognised then for her distinguished service to religion and as a pioneering role-model for women.

Across the Seas – Another New Archbishop



Bishop James Wong of the Seychelles has been elected as the new Archbishop and Primate of the Church of the Province of the Indian Ocean. Archbishop James says that he is committing himself to the fostering of links within the Communion.


