Advent

I love the season of Advent – the change to purple after the long months of green, the weekly lighting of another Advent Candle, the hymns with their wonderful poetry reflecting the longing of God's

people for Christ's coming, the sense of anticipation of Christmas. And of course, the reminding that the coming of Christ (both the 1st – the Incarnation, and the 2nd – the Parousia) has a history. During Advent we read much of that history in the prophets of the First Testament and some of the strange Gospel passages known as Apocalyptic writing.

Here in the Diocese of Adelaide we celebrate our own mark in history with the 25th anniversary of the ordination of the first women to the priesthood (both in the Diocese and Australia, though well behind other parts of the Anglican Communion). That history is told in the stories of those who alerted the church to the missing role of the priestly ministry of women and their struggle to be recognized and finally ordained. Established in Sydney in 1983, the Movement for the Ordination of Women in Australia (MOW) campaigned relentlessly and bravely until, finally, General Synod passed a motion allowing women to be priested.

Just two weeks later, and the day before Advent Sunday, on 5th December 1992, five women - Joan Claring-Bould, Flo Monahan, Susan Straub, Sue Pain and Juliana Rees SI - were ordained priest in St Peter's Cathedral. (Two of these "First Five" write something of their experiences below.) Since then many women have taken their rightful place presiding at the altar, and St Peter's has been, and continues to be, blessed by the ministry of women priests, with yet another chapter added following the ordination to the

diaconate of Wendy Morecroft on 25th November 2017.

As we sing the lovely Advent hymns let us give thanks to God for the gift of God's Son, whose arrival is so eagerly anticipated, and whose birth on Christmas Day so joyfully celebrated.

May Christ indeed "come down like showers upon the fruitful earth, and love, joy, hope, like flowers, spring in his path to birth..."

Reflecting on their experiences Joan Claring-Bould and Sister Juliana SI (two of the "First Five") write:'

The day of our ordination was a culmination of many years of reflecting, praying, dreaming about a vocation each of us believed that we were called to. We knew that our priesting would be a cause of great joy for many, but sadness and even anger for some. The service itself reflected that, when a bishop and a couple of lay people objected to the ordination proceeding. The Cathedral was a wonderful place for me to begin my ministry as a priest. I am always grateful for the patience, love and support of the Cathedral community from that time until now.

When I recognised my calling to priesthood, I was dismayed ... not because I did not like the thought of being a priest. But I realised it would require pioneering and I had already pioneered in co-founding a contemporary women's religious community, the Sisters of the Incarnation (SI). I knew the pain and struggle of that all too well.

Certainly the ordination was super stressful with the objections during the service! But, my life as a priest has been fulfilling and fruitful. Priesthood for me is grounded in the worship of a parish... it is being at the altar celebrating Eucharist with the people that I feel most at home in my priesthood.... it is the bedrock of my life as a priest even in my retirement from full time work.



Building Works around the Cathedral-2018

Next year is promising to be a busy one as we begin to tick off some long-term Conservation works outlined for us way back in 2014. As always, we recognize that what we do today is our gift to the future, while giving thank for the generosity of those who built St Peter's Cathedral into the sacred space we love today.

Memorial Garden Access Project


Beginning in January, access for a crane (as well as general mobility) will be provided off Pennington Terrace on the south side of the Cathedral. The long term cost-savings will be considerable as this access means we can clean high level gutters and down-pipes regularly without having to put in an expensive roof ladder system. Money for this has been budgeted from the Memorial Garden Fund and the use of recent bequests. Marshall & Brougham are the successful tenderer.

Stage 1 of the Roof

Beginning late March, scaffolding will be erected on the south side to reach the top of the lantern tower and enable reroofing above the organ and pulpit side of the chancel. Welsh slate, sufficient for Stage 2 as well, is on order (\$80,000 worth). Money will come, we trust, jointly from the Diocese and Adelaide City Council. (An approach to the State for heritage funding has been turned down.)

Organ re-installation

From about late June, the Cathedral Organ will be rebuilt following its time in Durham, UK. Over \$900,000 of the estimated \$2.1 million has already been raised. Significant fund-raising still needs to occur in order to see this project paid for. Donations large and small are sought – the new Christmas Appeal 2017 brochure is now available.


David joined the Cathedral choir as a treble and began learning the organ with David Swale.
