Festival of Living Faith? We don't often associate Lent with the *festival* – let alone 'living faith'. So why use this name for this part of our Festival 150 year? For the first few centuries Christians focused on their response to the preaching of St Peter. In the first recorded sermon Peter proclaimed that God had raised Jesus up, having freed him from death (Acts 2: 22ff). The response of people to this extraordinary claim was just as surprising, "What should we do?" (Acts 2: 37) So began the Church, the gathering together of people who believed Jesus had been raised from the dead. They shared a common life based on the teaching of the apostles, enjoying fellowship, breaking bread and saying prayers together. (Acts 2: 42)

This faith in the Resurrected One was a *living* faith.

FESTIVAL of LIVING FAITH

Since those early days, it has influenced and shaped the way Christians live. Primarily focused on Easter Day, the day of resurrection, the weekly celebration of Eucharist is a sort of mini-Easter... before we are sent out to love and serve the Lord in our daily lives.

For nearly 150 years Christians have gathered in St Peter's Cathedral, to worship and to share the Eucharist, shaping our lives around the resurrection, building a living faith.


During Lent, at Sunday evensong, Canon Jenny will be exploring just how a cathedral (or church) building can be part of that shaping. And on Sunday mornings, I will invite us to look more closely at what it means to live *into* God: being dynamic, alive and open to the promptings of God

through the Holy Spirit; hence the idea of a *Festival of Living Faith*.


Lent begins on Ash Wednesday with the solemn signing of the cross in ash and the reminder that we are but dust, and to dust we shall return.

I write this piece at the end of a sad and traumatic week for survivors of sexual abuse, for the Christian Church and the Roman Catholic Church in particular. The traditional Gospel reading on the First Sunday of Lent is that of the temptations of Jesus; a timely reminder that Jesus rejected the grasping of power and privilege that leads to arrogance and a sense of invincibility. The simple ash cross marked on our foreheads prompts us to recall that each and every one is capable of making bad choices; choices which can have profoundly damaging and lasting effects on other people. At St Peter's Cathedral, and throughout the Anglican Diocese of Adelaide, we continue to work hard to ensure that our church is a safe place for everyone.

As the weeks of Lent flow towards Easter, may we enter more deeply into a Living Faith based on Jesus's call to Peter and others to "Follow me."

CELEBRATING THE PAST + IMAGINING THE FUTURE PROTECTING THE ENVIRONMENT

Extract from Canon Jenny's sermon, 24 February

David Attenborough, the naturalist and broadcaster who understands and loves so many things about our planet speaks about the effect of plastics on the environment. "We've seen albatrosses come back with their belly full of food for their young and nothing in it. The albatross parent has been away for three weeks gathering stuff for her young and what comes out? What does she give her chick? You think it's going to be squid, but it's plastic. The chick is going to starve and die." ¹

We pondered this problem of plastic waste last year when we were reflecting on the story of Jesus healing a leper. The leper had cried out to Jesus, "If you choose, you can make me clean"? And we heard Jesus say, "I do choose, be made clean." And then we imagined God looking at our planet.

What does God see as God looks upon our planet from the sky? We wondered. A white film of plastic on the shores and seas that were to be a safe home for sea life, for human life? A white film of this substance that threatens to choke us.... A white film not unlike leprosy, perhaps, on the planet?

Does the planet cry out to God ... "If you choose, you can make me clean"?

Somehow, though, it seems God can only respond through us. With God's spirit encouraging us, inspiring us. We may choose to help make the planet clean from plastic waste.

David Attenborough sees hope. He said this:

"Plastic manufacturers happily say when you've used it throw it away, discard it. There is no away. Plastic is so permanent, so indestructible that when you've cast it into the ocean it does not go away. ... I am certain that when people understand the consequences of what they are doing that they will care for the rest of the world in a profound way ... There are simple things that we can do...." ²

Here in our Cathedral as part of our 150 Festival celebrations we have embarked on a project that is one of David Attenborough's "simple things". Our Festival 150 tag line is "celebrating the past-imagining the future". We have had a hessian shopping bag with a slightly different tagline: "celebrating the past - protecting the future"- the words on the bag with our Festival 150 logo are in green of course!

The AGM of the Cathedral is a significant event in the life of our community. Not only is it a sort of stock-take of the year past, but an opportunity to choose, by election, those we wish to represent us in making decisions about our corporate church life in the coming year. Every three years, and this is one of them, we also elect people to represent us at Diocesan Synod.

Why “Vestry” meeting? In days gone by meetings were held in the vestry, or sacristy, of a church – possibly the only meeting space available. The name of the meeting space transferred to the actual meeting and the decision-making body – no matter the venue. For a very long time the Vestry, as the only local body council, had considerable power and say over how village life was run and funds spent. Today jurisdiction is more limited to the life of a church parish.



St Peter's Cathedral hosted the annual World Day of Prayer on 1 March. The service for this year, devised by women in Slovenia, was used throughout the world on this day – a moving expression of international ecumenism and co-operation.
