Welcome:

Love God. Love your neighbour. The two great commands that Jesus brings together in Matthew 22: 34 are well known. More difficult is the execution of these commands; nor is it always clear or easy to know how to get the balance right. Jacinda Ardern, re-elected Prime Minister of New Zealand last weekend, has made a point of ending many of her public addresses during Covid-19 times by encouraging kindness. That sort of encouragement by a political leader stands out because it is so unusual. But what a very simple way of loving neighbour. And being kind is perhaps a less loaded concept than 'love'.

There is also the challenge of the Parable of the Good Samaritan found in Luke 10, where Jesus expands the concept of neighbour well beyond those we like, get along with, agree with and so on. Striving to be both Christ-centred and inclusive (see the bottom of this page) means taking the concept of 'neighbour' seriously. With the God-focused lives our baptism proclaims our neighbour comes ever more clearly into focus too.

¹ Then Moses went up from the plains of Moab to Mount Nebo, to the top of Pisgah, which is opposite Jericho, and the Lord showed him the whole land: Gilead as far as Dan, ² all Naphtali, the land of Ephraim and Manasseh, all the land of Judah as far as the Western Sea, ³ the Negeb, and the Plain—that is, the valley of Jericho, the city of palm trees—as far as Zoar. ⁴ The Lord said to him, 'This is the land of which I swore to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob, saying, "I will give it to your descendants"; I have let you see it with your eyes, but you shall not cross over there.' ⁵ Then Moses, the servant of the Lord, died there in the land of Moab, at the Lord's command. ⁶ He was buried in a valley in the land of Moab, opposite Beth-peor, but no one knows his burial place to this day. ⁷

Second reading: 1 Thessalonians 2.1-13 (read by Wendy Dawes)

You yourselves know, brothers and sisters, that our coming to you was not in vain, ²but though we had already suffered and been shamefully maltreated at Philippi, as you know, we had courage in our God to declare to you the gospel of God in spite of great opposition. ³For our appeal does not spring from deceit or

impure motives or trickery, ⁴but just as we have been approved by God to be entrusted with the message of the gospel, even so we speak, not to please mortals, but to please God who tests our hearts. ⁵As you know and as God is our witness, we never came with words of flattery or with a pretext for greed; ⁶nor did we seek praise from mortals, whether from you or from others, ⁷though we might have made demands as apostles of Christ. But we were gentle among you, like a nurse tenderly caring for her own children. ⁸So deeply do we care for you that we are determined to share with you not only the gospel of God but also our own selves, because you have become very dear to us.

- ⁹ You remember our labour and toil, brothers and sisters; we worked night and day, so that we might not burden any of you while we proclaimed to you the gospel of God. ¹⁰You are witnesses, and God also, how pure, upright, and blameless our conduct was towards you believers. ¹¹As you know, we dealt with each one of you like a father with his children, ¹²urging and encouraging you and pleading that you should lead a life worthy of God, who calls you into his own kingdom and glory.
- ¹³ We also constantly give thanks to God for this, that when you received the word of God that you heard from us, you accepted it not as a human word but as what it really is, God's word, which is also at work in you believers.




