Welcome: As we light the 2nd of the Advent candles today, known as the Candle of Peace, we are offered several stunning readings to reflect on. Who could not be moved by the words of Deutero-Isaiah, so well-known from Handel's *Messiah* – "Comfort, O comfort my people..." How those ancient people of God longed to hear that God had not forgotten them. How the people in the Tigray area of Ethiopia, of Yemen, and elsewhere in the world must long to hear words of peace spoken.

The opening words of Mark's Gospel waste no time in bringing us to the very heart of the Gospel and the message of John the Baptist. How we need people today who can cut to the quick of issues, hold up a mirror to society, suggest meaningful change (repentance) and then direct us to the one who embodies the Good News.

Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God. ² Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that she has served her term, that her penalty is paid, that she has received from the Lord 's hand double for all her sins.

³ A voice cries out: 'In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. ⁴ Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain. ⁵ Then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken.'

⁶ A voice says, 'Cry out!' And I said, 'What shall I cry?' All people are grass, their constancy is like the flower of the field. ⁷ The grass withers, the flower fades, when the breath of the Lord blows upon it; surely the people are grass. ⁸ The grass withers, the flower fades; but the word of our God will stand for ever. ⁹ Get you up to a high mountain, O Zion, herald of good tidings; lift up your voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good tidings, lift it up, do not fear; say to the cities of Judah, 'Here is your God!' ¹⁰ See, the Lord God comes with might, and his arm rules for him; his reward is with him, and his recompense before him. ¹¹ He will feed his flock like a shepherd; he will gather the lambs in his arms, and carry them in his bosom, and gently lead the mother sheep.

But do not ignore this one fact, beloved, that with the Lord one day is like a thousand years, and a thousand years are like one day. ⁹ The Lord is not slow about his promise, as some think of slowness, but is patient with you, not wanting any to perish, but all to come to repentance. ¹⁰ But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a loud noise, and the elements will be dissolved with fire, and the earth and everything that is done on it will be disclosed.

¹¹ Since all these things are to be dissolved in this way, what sort of people ought you to be in leading lives of holiness and godliness, ¹² waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be set ablaze and dissolved, and the elements will melt with fire? ¹³ But, in accordance with his promise, we wait for new heavens and a new earth, where righteousness is at home.

¹⁴ Therefore, beloved, while you are waiting for these things, strive to be found by him at peace, without spot or blemish; ¹⁵ and regard the patience of our Lord as salvation.

- The Archbishop, the Most Rev'd Geoffrey Smith
- The Archdeacon of the City and the Port, the Ven David Bassett
- The Cathedral Churchwardens: Reuben Jacob and Kevin Stracey
- Two Diocesan Nominators: Geoff Bloor and the Rev'd Janet Phillips
- Three members elected by the Cathedral Vestry: Angela Evans, Rijke Mellor and Joe Thorp

In the coming weeks we will be distributing a draft Parish Profile to the Cathedral community for feedback. This is a document which will be given to candidates to provide them with information on the Cathedral and what the job of Dean entails. Members of the Cathedral community are encouraged to consider any priests they are aware of who might be suited to be our new Dean, and to bring their name to the attention of any of the members of the Nomination Committee. It is important that you do not approach potential candidates, formally or even informally. That is solely the responsibility of the Bishop. Please also note that the Nomination Committee's work is confidential, and we will not be able to report on our discussions about possible candidates.
