10:30am 13 December 2020 The Third Sunday of Advent

Welcome: The history of the Advent wreath appears to have its origins in the Lutheran Church of the 16th century, but really only gained traction in the 19th. Johan Wichern, working with children in a Hamburg mission, found a way of curbing the children's excitement at the approach of Christmas and, in the process, a teaching tool. Wichern's wreath was an old wagon wheel with twenty-four candles – a larger one marking each Sunday.

Advent as a time of reflection and preparation for Christmas goes back into the 4th century when it was treated rather like a mini-Lent, complete with fasting and alms-giving. This would be where the purple candles and vestments come from. It's a complicated liturgical time – combining repentance and sorrow for sin, along with a growing excitement and expectation of the celebration of the birth of the one called Emmanuel.

For many, this Christmas will be a difficult time after this most extra-ordinary of years. Next Sunday's "Blue Christmas" service may be one worth considering. As I write we still do not have any real indication of numbers allowed for Christmas services, or whether there will be congregational singing.

Welcome to all as we light the third Advent candle – the candle of joy.

- The Archdeacon of the City and the Port, the Ven David Bassett
- The Cathedral Churchwardens: Reuben Jacob and Kevin Stracey
- Two Diocesan Nominators: Geoff Bloor and the Rev'd Janet Phillips
- Three members elected by the Cathedral Vestry: Angela Evans, Rijke Mellor and Joe Thorp

In the coming weeks we will be distributing a draft Parish Profile to the Cathedral community for feedback. This is a document which will be given to candidates to provide them with information on the Cathedral and what the job of Dean entails.

Members of the Cathedral community are encouraged to consider any priests they are aware of who might be suited to be our new Dean, and to bring their name to the attention of any of the members of the Nomination Committee. It is important that you do not approach potential candidates, formally or even informally. That is solely the responsibility of the Bishop. Please also note that the Nomination Committee's work is confidential, and we will not be able to report on our discussions about possible candidates.
