Lighting of Candles (Please be seated)

The season of Christmas is not always one of joy and goodwill, and many struggle to respond to the merry greetings of those around us. Some of us have a loved one who is ill, or has died. Others are trapped in loneliness, illness or loss – loss of work, of friendship, of broken dreams. Many of us are confused and afraid of the future. And so we turn to God and lay our burdens before God, as we light candles to remind us that Jesus is the light of the world.

The Christ Candle (Paschal Candle) is lit

We light this candle, the candle of Christ's light and life, and symbol of God's presence with us even in the darkness. We remember all who gaze into the night sky with longing and with hope, all who listen for the song of the angels. We pray that this light will also kindle a flame of hope in our heavy hearts.

Other candles are lit from the Christ Candle

We light this *candle of memory and loss*, inviting Christ's light into our darkness. We remember those we have loved and lost. We acknowledge our sorrow and we look to the light in hope.

We light this *candle of compassion and community* in honour of the hope and support we have received from family and friends who have walked with us. We thank you, Holy God, for your expression of love through them.

We light this *candle of wisdom* as a prayer for the grace to accept what cannot be changed and to move forward even when our hearts are raging against the pain. May we be at peace in Christ's light.

We light this *candle of faith*, believing that even when we feel most alone, you, O Lord, are with us; even when we deny you and run from you, your love never changes. May our faith be strengthened day by day.

While the Choir sings you are invited to come forward and light a candle. There is no hurry. Let your candle burn as a symbol of light and hope.

Please sit for the first reading: Isaiah 11:1-9 (read by Chris Goodes)

A shoot shall come out from the stock of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots.

But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.
