Welcome: Lent, with its forty days, has its origins in the dim distant past of the Christian Church, possibly dating from the time of the great Council of Nicea in the 4th century. Beginning on Ash Wednesday Lent invites us on a journey with Christ. Each Sunday we are offered some of the significant readings in the Bible – ones which help us understand God’s love, Jesus’s call to follow, and our response to that call.

Where some people still use Lent as a time to ‘give up’ something, often a luxury which we would be better without anyway, others use Lent as a time for growing and moving further on our journey into Christ. Still others will be using this time as intentional preparation for baptism and confirmation on Easter Day. However we use Lent – perhaps attending a weekday service, a study group, reading significant chunks of the bible, saving money to give to the needy, writing a letter that needs to be written – may we stay close to Jesus.

Welcome to all who gather today to worship God through Jesus and in the power of the Holy Spirit.

Give us the will to use the resources of the earth to your glory, and for the good of all.



God of the new and eternal covenant, as the forty days of the great flood swept away the world's corruption and watered new beginnings of righteousness and life: grant to us, who are washed clean and born again in the saving flood of baptism, the wellspring of your grace, that your gift of new life may flourish once again; through Jesus Christ our Redeemer, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The Collect for Ash Wednesday

Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing that you have made, and you forgive the sins of all who are penitent: create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we, worthily lamenting our sins, and acknowledging our wretchedness, may obtain of you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Then God said to Noah and to his sons with him, ⁹ 'As for me, I am establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you, ¹⁰ and with every living creature that is with you, the birds, the domestic animals, and every animal of the earth with

you, as many as came out of the ark. ¹¹ I establish my covenant with you, that never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth.' ¹² God said, 'This is the sign of the covenant that I make between me and you and every living creature that is with you, for all future generations: ¹³ I have set my bow in the clouds, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. ¹⁴ When I bring clouds over the earth and the bow is seen in the clouds, ¹⁵ I will remember my covenant that is between me and you and every living creature of all flesh; and the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh. ¹⁶ When the bow is in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and every living creature of all flesh that is on the earth.' ¹⁷ God said to Noah, 'This is the sign of the covenant that I have established between me and all flesh that is on the earth.'

For Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, ¹⁹ in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, ²⁰ who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight people, were saved through water. ²¹ And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you – not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, ²² who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

In preparing the profile, it was especially helpful that so many members of the Cathedral community took part in the NCLS survey before lockdown last year, so we were able to include well-founded data about the congregation and its values and priorities.

Please continue to pray for the Nomination Committee's work of identifying who God is calling to the role of Dean:

give to this parish a faithful pastor
who will faithfully speak your word
and minister your sacraments;
an encourager who will equip your people for ministry
