Welcome: Today we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit as promised by our Lord. The Holy Spirit is God with and within us. This must reassure us. There is very little in this life that will bring us complete assurance. We have the encouragement of friends and family, and the support of those people who love us, and this is wonderful and appreciated by all. The most powerful form of reassurance comes to us through our prayer with God. We can tell God anything; we can ask God for anything; we can seek guidance and we can be reassured that our prayers will be answered.

Of course, our prayers must also reflect the integrity of our faith. When we pray, we pray for all people equally; we are to acknowledge that God loves every person of his creation. When there is conflict between countries and nations, we are wise when we pray for a just and right conclusion to hostilities: Regardless of where our sympathies may lay. It is risky to pray for only one side of a conflict, when there may be people we know and love who are praying for the other side, or indeed praying for both sides. It is better to place the problem before God in its entirety so that justice and Godly Truth may be seen to be the right and proper outcome. It is not for us to judge people, or to be seen to take sides, rather, we are to pray for all people equally.

The hand of the Lord came upon me, and he brought me out by the spirit of the Lord and set me down in the middle of a valley; it was full of bones. He led me all round them; there were very many lying in the valley, and they were very dry. He said to me, 'Mortal, can these bones live?' I answered, 'O Lord God, you know.' Then he said to me, 'Prophesy to these bones, and say to them: O dry bones, hear the word of the Lord. Thus says the Lord God to these bones: I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. I will lay sinews on you, and will cause flesh to come upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and you shall live; and you shall know that I am the Lord.'

So I prophesied as I had been commanded; and as I prophesied, suddenly there was a noise, a rattling, and the bones came together, bone to its bone. I looked, and there were sinews on them, and flesh had come upon them, and skin had covered them; but there was no breath in them.

Then he said to me, 'Prophesy to the breath, prophesy, mortal, and say to the breath: Thus says the Lord God: Come from the four winds, O breath, and breathe upon these slain, that they may live.' I prophesied as he commanded me, and the breath came into them, and they lived, and stood on their feet, a vast multitude.

Then he said to me, 'Mortal, these bones are the whole house of Israel. They say, "Our bones are dried up, and our hope is lost; we are cut off completely." Therefore prophesy, and say to them, Thus says the Lord God: I am going to open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people; and I will bring you back to the land of Israel. And you shall know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves, and bring you up from your graves, O my people. I will put my spirit within you, and you shall live, and I will place you on your own soil; then you shall know that I, the Lord, have spoken and will act, says the Lord.'

Second reading: Acts 2:1-21 (read by Ellen Beal)

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, 'Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome,

both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs – in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power.' All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, 'What does this mean?' But others sneered and said, 'They are filled with new wine.'

But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them: 'Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

"In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved." Hear the word of the Lord, thanks be to God.





A Statement on Events in Israel/Palestine from the Council of Christians and Jews **(SA):** We are appalled by what we are currently witnessing in Israel and Gaza. We are deeply saddened about intercommunal violence between Jews and Arabs as a result of the stoking of tensions by irresponsible actors in Israeli and Palestinian political life. We especially deplore acts of violence within sacred spaces or to people on the way to and from sacred spaces; whether Al-Aqsa Mosque, synagogues in Israel, or the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. We condemn all types of violence and oppression, and our particular concern is therefore for the civilians caught up in this conflict — Jews, Christians and Muslims – who wish only for a peaceful life in a land that is holy to all of them. We view with some hope the fact that there are organisations even within the current context of violence which seek to bring Jews, Christians and Muslims together in the pursuit of mutual understanding. We pray for an immediate de-escalation of the violence and for peace to return to the land that we all hold so dear. In accordance with Psalm 122 — common to both Jewish and Christian scriptures — we pray for the peace of Jerusalem, for there to be peace within its walls and security within its citadels, for the sake of our kindred and friends, and for the house of the Lord our God. - Dr Ron Hoenig, Chair
