Evening Prayer The Sixth Sunday After Pentecost 6:00pm 4 July 2021

Welcome: Today we read of the disciples being sent out in pairs to spread the gospel message of salvation and to use the power of our Lord to heal the sick and to cast out demons. They were not to carry a great load of stuff, but were to only wear their everyday clothes, sandals and for self-protection to carry a staff.

When they were made welcome, they were to stay and continue the work of our Lord. If they were not made welcome, they were to shake the dust from their feet as they departed. This custom of shaking the dust from the feet is a Jewish action used primarily when they left the country of the pagans, or the heathens, or the people who did not think as they thought.

For the disciples to shake the dust from their feet as they departed a Jewish community would have been very confronting. It indicated that the Jewish people had rejected the message from God and were in the same category as the pagans. It does raise an interesting question. When Jesus was in his own community, and his own community refused to believe that he was in any way a messenger from God, did he shake the dust from his feet as he left? I will leave you with this conundrum. What do you think?

Amen.

Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who desireth not the death of a sinner, but rather that they may turn from their wickedness, and live; and hath given power and commandment to his Ministers, to declare and pronounce to his people, being penitent, the Absolution and Remission of their sins: He pardoneth and absolveth all them that truly repent and unfeignedly believe his holy Gospel. Please remain seated for the first reading: 2 Samuel 5:11-13, 17-25 (read by David Lockett) King Hiram of Tyre sent messengers to David, along with cedar trees, and carpenters and masons who built David a house. David then perceived that the Lord had established him king over Israel, and that he had exalted his kingdom for the sake of his people Israel.

In Jerusalem, after he came from Hebron, David took more concubines and wives; and more sons and daughters were born to David.

When the Philistines heard that David had been anointed king over Israel, all the Philistines went up in search of David; but David heard about it and went down to the stronghold. Now the Philistines had come and spread out in the valley of Rephaim. David inquired of the Lord, 'Shall I go up against the Philistines? Will you give them into my hand?' The Lord said to David, 'Go up; for I will certainly give the Philistines into your hand.' So David came to Baal-perazim, and David defeated them there. He said, 'The Lord has burst forth against my enemies before me, like a bursting flood.' Therefore that place is called Baal-perazim. The Philistines abandoned their idols there, and David and his men carried them away.

Once again the Philistines came up, and were spread out in the valley of Rephaim. When David inquired of the Lord, he said, 'You shall not go up; go round to their rear, and come upon them opposite the balsam trees. When you hear the sound of marching in the tops of the balsam trees, then be on the alert; for then the Lord has gone out before you to strike down the army of the Philistines.' David did just as the Lord had commanded him; and he struck down the Philistines from Geba all the way to Gezer.

He hath filled the hungry with good things: and the rich he hath sent empty away. He remembering his mercy hath holpen his servant Israel: as he promised to our forefathers, Abraham and his seed for ever. Glory be to the Father, and to the Son: and to the Holy Ghost; As it was in the beginning, is now, and ever shall be: world without end. Amen.

Please sit for the second reading: 2 Corinthians 13:4-13 (read by Alison Lockett)

For he was crucified in weakness, but lives by the power of God. For we are weak in him, but in dealing with you we will live with him by the power of God.

Examine yourselves to see whether you are living in the faith. Test yourselves. Do you not realize that Jesus Christ is in you? — unless, indeed, you fail to pass the test! I hope you will find out that we have not failed. But we pray to God that you may not do anything wrong — not that we may appear to have passed the test, but that you may do what is right, though we may seem to have failed. For we cannot do anything against the truth, but only for the truth. For we rejoice when we are weak and you are strong. This is what we pray for, that you may become perfect. So I write these things while I am away from you, so that when I come, I may not have to be severe in using the authority that the Lord has given me for building up and not for tearing down.

Finally, brothers and sisters, farewell. Put things in order, listen to my appeal, agree with one another, live in peace; and the God of love and peace will be with you. Greet one another with a holy kiss. All the saints greet you.

The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with all of you.
