# The Eleventh Sunday After Pentecost 6:00pm 8 August 2021

Welcome: It was not so long ago that if a person were to wear a mask, or a motorcycle helmet, into a bank, the police would be alerted to the possibility of wrongdoing. To wear a burka in public would likely bring suspicion and public scrutiny. To wear a mask to church would have caused suspicion of domestic violence or terrible acne. How times have changed.

Last week, for the first time, we were instructed to wear a mask when attending worship in St Peter's Cathedral. I am thankful that every person who attended did indeed wear a mask, and diligently raised and lowered it for the consumption of the Blessed Sacrament.

It was also evident that the number of people attending worship was lower than average. As a result, the prayer for Spiritual Communion was included at the time of administration. For the people who participate in the livestreamed service, this helps us to be aware that even when absent from the Cathedral we can still participate in that most Holy of activities, the reception of the Body and Blood of our Lord Jesus.

Spiritual Communion is not a new thing recently invented. There have always been people critically ill who have lost the capacity to swallow even the most minute morsel of food. For these people the priest has offered, and will continue to offer, Spiritual Communion.

A note on the wearing of face masks: Under current COVID restrictions, masks are mandatory in all indoor public places, including all places of worship. If you can wear a mask, you must wear a mask.

# Please sit for the first reading: 2 Samuel 19:1-15 (read by Kirsty Munro)

It was told Joab, 'The king is weeping and mourning for Absalom.' So the victory that day was turned into mourning for all the troops; for the troops heard that day, 'The king is grieving for his son.' The troops stole into the city that day as soldiers steal in who are ashamed when they flee in battle. The king covered his face, and the king cried with a loud voice, 'O my son Absalom, O Absalom, my son, my son!' Then Joab came into the house to the king, and said, 'Today you have covered with shame the faces of all your officers who have saved your life today, and the lives of your sons and your daughters, and the lives of your wives and your concubines, for love of those who hate you and for hatred of those who love you. You have made it clear today that commanders and officers are nothing to you; for I perceive that if Absalom were alive and all of us were dead today, then you would be pleased. So go out at once and speak kindly to your servants; for I swear by the Lord, if you do not go, not a man will stay with you this night; and this will be worse for you than any disaster that has come upon you from your youth until now.' Then the king got up and took his seat in the gate. The troops were all told, 'See, the king is sitting in the gate'; and all the troops came before the king.

Meanwhile, all the Israelites had fled to their homes. All the people were disputing throughout all the tribes of Israel, saying, 'The king delivered us from the hand of our enemies, and saved us from the hand of the Philistines; and now he has fled out of the land because of Absalom. But Absalom, whom we anointed over us, is dead in battle. Now therefore why do you say nothing about bringing the king back?'

King David sent this message to the priests Zadok and Abiathar, 'Say to the elders of Judah, "Why should you be the last to bring the king back to his house? The talk of all Israel has come to the king. You are my kin, you are my bone and my flesh; why then should you be the last to bring back the king?" And say to Amasa,

"Are you not my bone and my flesh? So may God do to me, and more, if you are not the commander of my army from now on, in place of Joab." Amasa swayed the hearts of all the people of Judah as one, and they sent word to the king, 'Return, both you and all your servants.' So the king came back to the Jordan; and Judah came to Gilgal to meet the king and to bring him over the Jordan.

Entirely out of place is obscene, silly, and vulgar talk; but instead, let there be thanksgiving. Be sure of this, that no fornicator or impure person, or one who is greedy (that is, an idolater), has any inheritance in the kingdom of Christ and of God.

Let no one deceive you with empty words, for because of these things the wrath of God comes on those who are disobedient. Therefore do not be associated with them. For once you were darkness, but now in the Lord you are light. Live as children of light — for the fruit of the light is found in all that is good and right and true. Try to find out what is pleasing to the Lord. Take no part in the unfruitful works of darkness, but instead expose them. For it is shameful even to mention what such people do secretly; but everything exposed by the light becomes visible, for everything that becomes visible is light. Therefore it says,

'Sleeper, awake! Rise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you.'
