Welcome: Remembrance Day

God shall judge between the nations, and shall arbitrate for many peoples; they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore. (Isaiah 2: 4)

Remembering is a very important activity. To forget the past lies the real danger of repeating it. This evening we remember those who have served in the theatres of war, especially those who gave their lives as the ultimate sacrifice. Australia today enjoys many freedoms won through the sacrifice of many young lives. Those who did return home brought with them many scars - physical, emotional, spiritual, and psychological. We thank God for their service and pray for those who continue to serve in the armed forces in defence our nation.

The Hebrew concept of 'anamnesis' is way of remembering that brings the past into the present. It is this type of remembering that is at the heart of the Jewish celebration of the Passover, and our own celebration of the Eucharist. It is also a concept that is part of First Nations' cultures. The past lives on in the present, bringing with it the living memory of our ancestors and the wisdom of the past. May we have this type of remembering.

A note on the wearing of face masks: Under current COVID restrictions, masks are mandatory in all indoor public places, including all places of worship. If you can wear a mask, you must wear a mask.

Dearly beloved, the Scripture moveth us in sundry places to acknowledge and confess our manifold sins and wickedness; and that we should not dissemble nor cloke them before the face of Almighty God our heavenly Father; but confess them with a humble, lowly, penitent, and obedient heart; to the end that we may obtain forgiveness of the same, by his infinite goodness and mercy. And although we ought at all times humbly to acknowledge our sins before God; yet ought we most chiefly so to do, when we assemble and meet together to render thanks for the great benefits that we have received at his hands, to set forth his most worthy praise, to hear his most holy Word, and to ask those things which are requisite and necessary, as well for the body as the soul. Wherefore I pray and beseech you, as many as are here present, to accompany me with a pure heart, and humble voice, unto the throne of the heavenly grace, saying after me:

Amen.

Thou art my God, my goods are nothing unto thee.

All my delight is upon the saints, that are in the earth: and upon such as excel in virtue.

neither make mention of their names within my lips.

Please sit for the first reading: 1 Samuel 1:21-18;2:11 (read by Michele de Courcy)

The man Elkanah and all his household went up to offer to the Lord the yearly sacrifice, and to pay his vow. But Hannah did not go up, for she said to her husband, 'As soon as the child is weaned, I will bring him, that he may appear in the presence of the Lord, and remain there for ever; I will offer him as a nazirite for all time.' Her husband Elkanah said to her, 'Do what seems best to you, wait until you have weaned him; only – may the Lord establish his word.' So the woman remained and nursed her son, until she weaned him. When she had weaned him, she took him up with her, along with a three-year-old bull, an ephah of flour, and a skin of wine. She brought him to the house of the Lord at Shiloh; and the child was young. Then they slaughtered the bull, and they brought the child to Eli. And she said, 'Oh, my lord! As you live, my lord, I am the woman who was standing here in your presence, praying to the Lord. For this child I prayed; and the Lord has granted me the petition that I made to him. Therefore I have lent him to the Lord; as long as he lives, he is given to the Lord.'

She left him there for the Lord. Then Elkanah went home to Ramah, while the boy remained to minister to the Lord, in the presence of the priest Eli.

It is a fearful thing to fall into the hands of the living God.

But recall those earlier days when, after you had been enlightened, you endured a hard struggle with sufferings, sometimes being publicly exposed to abuse and persecution, and sometimes being partners with those so treated. For you had compassion for those who were in prison, and you cheerfully accepted the plundering of your possessions, knowing that you yourselves possessed something better and more lasting. Do not, therefore, abandon that confidence of yours; it brings a great reward. For you need endurance, so that when you have done the will of God, you may receive what was promised. For yet

'in a very little while,

the one who is coming will come and will not delay;

but my righteous one will live by faith.

My soul takes no pleasure in anyone who shrinks back.'

But we are not among those who shrink back and so are lost, but among those who have faith and so are saved.
