We gather this Sunday, at the close of our liturgical year to celebrate the Feast of Christ the King and to ponder the idea of the Kingdom of God. Scholars tell us that word for kingdom in the language of the New Testament, Greek, basilea, is not so much about a geographical place, as it is about the reign of God, about a world where God's love, God's guiding presence, God's forgiveness, God's delight in and longing to heal all God has created, is the abiding influence.

The gospel reading we are given as our guide this Sunday is from Chapter 18 of the Gospel according to St John, John's account of Jesus' trial before Pilate. We see Pilate question Jesus about his being a king and we see Jesus respond with his own questions of Pilate. The abiding sign of the kingdom of God, it seems, is the presence of truth.

Welcome to all who come to our Cathedral to worship this morning. A particular welcome to those who are with us for the first time.





The gifts of God for the people of God. Come let us take this holy sacrament of the body and blood of Christ in remembrance that he died for us, and feed on him in our hearts by faith with thanksgiving.

Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world, have mercy upon us. (*x*2) Lamb of God, you take away the sins of the world, grant us your peace.

Baptised and communicant Christians of all denominations are welcome to receive Holy Communion. Communion will be administered at the nave platform in one kind (bread) only.

Please keep your face mask on as you line up.

Please follow the guidance of stewards and servers. If you do not wish to receive Holy Communion, you may like to come forward and receive a blessing (simply bow your head as a signal). Gluten free bread is available; please ask for this from the priest giving communion.

During the administration of Holy Communion the Choir will sing the Motet: Charles Wood (1866-1926) – Oculi Omnium

Oculi omnium in te sperant Domine: et tu das illis escam in tempore opportuno. *The eyes of all wait upon thee, O Lord; and thou givest them their meat in due season.*

For those who cannot physically receive Holy Communion, the celebrant will read this prayer for Spiritual Communion
