Welcome:

Brothers and sisters, join in imitating me, and observe those who live according to the example you have in us (Philippians 3: 17).

These are very challenging words from St Paul. Who of us would make such a request today? It is a very tall order to ask others to imitate you. I'm sure it is not a request that I would make but it speaks of St Paul's confidence in the power of the cross of Christ. This is the key to understanding St Paul's thinking here. St Paul is not saying that he is perfect in every possible way, and we should be like him. He is saying we should be like him in centering our faith in the cross of Christ. This makes sense if we take into consideration the following verse: For many live as enemies of the cross of Christ; I have often told you of them, and now I tell you even with tears (Philippians 3: 18).

The cross is at the heart of St Paul's faith. The Lenten journey moves us to imitate St Paul in this. However, it does not end there. St Paul knows that glory awaits us in the future; a future which we have a glimpse of in the resurrection of Jesus. This is at the heart of our ministry at the Cathedral. Everything we do is in service of the wonderful and transformative proclamation of the Gospel.






