

FROM THE DEAN



I trust you enjoy reading through the various vestry reports. My policy is not to repeat what others have said so well. I thank all those who have presented a report. It is evidence of the

many people who are involved in the life of the Cathedral. We are so blessed to have so many people who offer their time and talents in service of God's Church in this place.

It is now four months since I started as Dean. I am enjoying the blessings and challenges of the ministry. I am still, of course, getting to know you all. Susan and I thank you for your warm welcome. As I have said on a number of occasions the Cathedral has been in the background of my ministry for over 30 years. I have been ordained here three times! However, this does not lead me to be complacent in ministry. It is a very challenging time in the life of Cathedrals. Cathedrals continue to be 'strong' in comparison to many parish churches. Many people are drawn to cathedrals because of the well-crafted liturgy, excellence in music, the sacredness of the building, and the rich congregational life. Without diminishing the importance of these, the former Dean of Winchester Cathedral, Trevor Beeson, reminds us that Cathedrals need to offer strong leadership in the area of mission in these changing times. We need

to be prepared to be innovative and flexible as we respond to God's Spirit. I am praying about how we can increase our missional activity and connect further with the people of Adelaide. I know I share this prayer with all of you.

I also want to note here my gratitude to the Rev'd Adrian Stephens who served as Locum Dean. Fr Adrian offered the Cathedral wise leadership during the interregnum with all the uncertainties brought about by the continuing impact of Covid-19. I will not repeat all of the challenges of Covid-19 here, except to say that we endeavor to deal with these in line with government guidelines to ensure that congregation members, visitors, volunteers, clergy and lay staff are kept as safe as possible. I also would like to note the contribution of the former Dean Frank Nelson and his wife. Christine, who served the Cathedral and the Diocese with passion and commitment.

Clergy

I was blessed to find a very committed and talented clergy staff when I arrived. Canon Jenny Wilson, the Rev'd Peter Jin, the Rev'd Dr Lynn Arnold, the Rev'd Joan Claring-Bould with the many clergy who assist are invaluable to the life of the Cathedral. I thank them! We are expecting the Rev'd Peter Jin to leave us some time this year, when a position becomes available, to take up his first Cure. Peter has learnt much here. He will take this valuable experience into his next ministry placement. We will look to the clergy staffing needs when Peter leaves us. when Peter leaves us.

Staff - Cathedral Office

The office has been well served by Kate Palmrose for ten years, and it is with sadness that we say goodbye to Kate as she moves into retirement. I know many of you have appreciated Kate's professionalism and commitment to making sure the Cathedral's administration is extremely efficient. I would have been lost without her and I'm sure that is true for my predecessors. There will be an opportunity to thank Kate and wish her well closer to the date of her departure - April 29, 2022. Wheels are in motion to find Kate's replacement. Shortly after I started our Administration Assistant, Rachel Bruerville, moved to another position. Suzanne Wilson has taken over her position and has become an invaluable member of the team. Robyn Shilock continues as Finance Officer.

National Aboriginal Bishop

There has been some interest in the role of the National Aboriginal Bishop, and its impact on the life of the Cathedral. The National Aboriginal Bishop has in the past been, largely, an honorary role, providing voice for First Nations' peoples to the Anglican Church of Australia through the Australian Bishops' Conference, the House of Bishops in the General Synod, and ex-officio member of the National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Council (NATSIAC). The National Aboriginal and National Torres Strait Islander Bishops are appointed by the Primate on recommendation of NATSIAC. I was fortunate to receive funding from Anglicare to enable me to perform this role alongside my duties as assistant Bishop and priest in charge of the Parish of Woodville. There is a small amount of funding provided from the National Indigenous Endowment Fund to cover travel and any other nonstipendiary expenses associated with the National Bishops' roles (E.g., this covers the cost for the National Aboriginal Bishop to attend the Australian Bishops' Conference). Just over 12 months ago this was increased to cover 0.2 FTE (one day a week) of the National Aboriginal Bishop's stipend in recognition of the need to provide General Synod ownership of the National Aboriginal Bishop's position.

So, in short – things have changed. The Cathedral will be my focus, with the National Aboriginal Bishop's position returning to a more limited role. The Indigenous Endowment Fund will continue to fund this role at 0.2 FTE. In 2022 I expect to perform my role as National Aboriginal Bishop through the councils of the Church (General Synod, the Australian Bishops' Conference, NATSIAC, and the Lambeth Conference).

General Comments

In closing, I thank the wardens and Cathedral Council for their service and leadership. There are so many vital ministries here at the Cathedral. I thank all of you for what you offer of your time and talents. I thank all of you for what you offer of your time and talents.

After almost ten years the Cathedral Shop Committee, Pauline Brooks, Rosie and John Hamilton, and Denise Stephenson have decided to retire. They have done an extraordinary job in 'Serving the Sacred'. I know you all join with me in thanking them for their dedication and service. An announcement will be made soon on the new committee. It is always a bit dangerous to single people out for thanks because many people will feel overlooked. I do appreciate all that is done at the Cathedral by so many people - Choir, organists and Director of Music, Anthony Hunt; Tour Guides; Welcomers; Friends; Stewards; Servers and Liturgy team; Hospitality team; Cathedral Kids; Pastoral Visitors; Bell Ringers; Flower

Guild; EFM; Social Home groups; Needlework Guild; Music Foundation; and Cinema Group.

Since arriving there have been so many wonderful worship occasions: the Diocesan Ordination, Christmas services, the Queens platinum jubilee service. I look forward to the Easter celebrations and the many other events that will occur this year. I am looking forward to our Christian journey together.

May the God of steadfastness and encouragement grant us to live in such harmony with one another in accord with Christ Jesus, that we may with one voice glorify our God and Father. (Romans 15: 5 – 6).

FROM THE WARDENS

Each year we seem to report as wardens on the constant change that is life at St Peter's Cathedral, and never more so than in 2021.

We bid farewell to Frank Nelson as Dean at Easter, with thanks for his leadership over eight years and especially through the organ restoration, the Cathedral 150 celebrations, and the many challenges thrown up by the Covid-19 pandemic. We were delighted with the celebrations of Frank and Christine's enormous contribution to the Cathedral, and that they were able to thread their way through the eye of the needle of travel restrictions to return to New Zealand.

Our concerns at heading into the unknown of an interregnum were allayed by the appointment of Fr Adrian Stephens as locum Dean, with his vast experience of running a large and thriving parish. And, of course, the continuity provided by the rest of our excellent clergy team, Jenny Wilson, Peter Jin, Lynn Arnold, and Joan Claring-Bould enabled us to carry on as normally as circumstances allowed. Similarly, Anthony Hunt and David Heah kept the choir's morale up and the music standard high in spite of cancelled events, and as we became used to the reality of singing in masks.

In the office, Kate Palmrose and Robyn Shilcock continued to take everything in their stride, and Rachel Bruerville's immense contribution continued, especially as we continued to wrestle with the challenges of live-streaming. While we were sad to say goodbye to Rachel, we were delighted that she has exciting opportunities ahead of her. We were pleased to welcome Suzanne Wilson, who took on many of Rachel's duties from October.

Most other activities in the community were able to continue or restart in some form during 2021, and as ever we thank all volunteers, especially acknowledging the leadership of the Cathedral Council.

We were delighted with the collegial spirit of the nomination committee under Archbishop Geoff Smith's leadership, and while few could have predicted the outcome, it was with great pleasure that we presented Bishop Chris McLeod for installation as Dean on All Hallows' Eve.

While the year ended with the Cathedral community becoming used to South Australia's first real wave of Covid infections, we have much to look forward to and be grateful for as we look to the future in 2022.

FROM THE TREASURER

The Treasurer's report at the 2021 vestry meeting noted that we were "entering a season of change following the Dean's retirement, and many uncertainties remain, especially around the continuing impact of Covid-19". The financial results for the year show the truth of that prediction. I also emphasised that individual years should not be treated in isolation: while we achieved an unexpected surplus in 2020, the overall trend remains to break even, and we budgeted for a significant shortfall in 2021.

The total outcome was close to the budgeted figure, but thanks to Covid-19 overall income and expenditure were both lower than anticipated. Visitor numbers and use of the Cathedral and hall buildings have not yet recovered to pre-pandemic levels. The move away from cash and passing the plate has also had a lasting impact on our open plate collections.

Meanwhile, we took the opportunity of the interregnum to renovate and upgrade the Deanery, and we hope that as well as being watertight, the house will now provide a better home for a Cathedral Dean in future, and a significant rental income while the Dean does not occupy it.

Cathedral Council has budgeted for a further year of significant shortfall in 2022, and we are aware that as we look further ahead we will need to work towards a break-even outcome. However, this can only be achieved by the unpalatable option of reducing costs (which is really to say by reducing staff), or by addressing successfully the challenge of increasing income. I sincerely hope that we will be able to find ways of increasing our income so that we can continue to maintain and improve the Cathedral's ministry in future.

GROWING IN FAITH

Music

2021 remained a challenging, but productive year for the Cathedral Choir.

The looming presence of COVID meant some frustration for the choir. The continued principals of social distancing were applied, spreading the choir out further in the choir stalls. After a lockdown in July, singing resumed in August - this time with the introduction of masks as an unfortunate necessity. This has continued to prove difficult for the choir, adults and children; but for all the desire to sing has outweighed the discomfort and difficulty (although the temperatures of summer have made this particularly tiring.) Despite that, 2021 had some great musical successes. The performance, with small orchestra, of the Faure Requiem on Good Friday was well received and a highlight of the year.

We were very happy to welcome Dr Joseph Nolan, late in August, who presented a magnificent organ recital, and worked with the choir singing the Vierne Messe Solennelle; this was a great treat for choristers and congregation, and thanks to the Music Foundation for supporting both of these events.

The Choral Winter School in July was a repeated success, welcoming many children to a first experience of music in the cathedral, and accepting new training choristers into the choir. Our Cathedral organist David Heah presented a wonderful recital in October, and the music department is fortunate to have David in the loft regularly on a Sunday, for his fine and sensitive playing, ably supported by the Organ Scholar Marco Callisto, sub-organist Coby Mellor and myself.

A final musical highlight of the year was the service for the Installation of our Dean, Bishop Chris McLeod.

Christmas saw the launch of the Music Foundation's recital program for 2022, an ambitious program designed to raise the profile of music at the Cathedral, and to raise funds and sponsorship going forward.

The number of young ones who turned up to this program varied again this year and they ranged from 24 on Palm Sunday to very small numbers last winter. They increased later in the year though we never knew how many to expect. Some parents were nervous about bringing unvaccinated children but others returned and attended regularly.



Bellringers

2021 had fewer COVID restrictions affecting bellringing than 2020, so we only missed 3 weeks of ringing.

The bells in the Bell Tower and the Ringing Centre are working well, with only normal regular maintenance.

We've had several new learners in 2021 who are progressing well, whilst our previous learners rang Quarter Peals during 2021 and are providing valuable assistance with service ringing. We rang 1 Peal and 4 Quarter Peals on the bells, and 2 Quarter Peals in the Ringing Centre, all with local ringers, although we did have a few interstate ring-ins for the Peal.

SERVERS & LITURGY TEAM

There are thirty-nine servers listed, aged from 79 to 6. The longest serving started in June 1966; the newest in October 2021, including all four members of one family.

Servers assist at nine regular acts of worship a week, plus special occasions – over 430 services a year.

In this report we focus on two roles: 'Master' of ceremonies (MC): at Eucharistic services sets up the altar, the Lectern and the Communion Vessels, and oversees the running of the service. Thurifer: lights the charcoals, prepares the incense and carries the thurible during worship. Assisted by the 'boatbearer' who carries spare incense in case topping up is required – also a learning role for the boat-bearer.

There were 8 participants who made the commitment to do their Year level reading and to prepare their responses to what they had read and to share with the group each week.

In 2021 there were two Year One two Year 3 and two Year 4 participants. Two Year four participants completed the four-year course and were presented with certificates.
