Welcome to St Peter's Cathedral. We are delighted to have you worship with us today for this service of Choral Evensong from The Book of Common Prayer. As the choir and clergy lead this service, allow the music and words to bring you into a stillness and prayerful reflection with God. Please join us in saying the words in bold. The hymns can be found in the separate hymn book. Indications for sitting, kneeling, and standing are a guide only.

This Sunday we celebrate the Feast of Mary, Mother of our Lord. The Archbishop of Canterbury, speaking at the Lambeth Conference last week said that "the Church is a place of revolution without violence, called to set the world the right way up," He described Mary's Song, the Magnificat, as "a statement of revolution not comfort ...the statement of a revolutionary."

As we reflect on Mary's life in word and in song, as we hear the Magnificat sung by the Cathedral Choir, may we find in Mary the inspiration for the church and, perhaps, even our own lives, to be places of revolution without violence.

SECOND LESSON

A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke

LUKE 1:26-38

In the sixth month the angel Gabriel was sent by God to a town in Galilee called Nazareth, to a virgin engaged to a man whose name was Joseph, of the house of David. The virgin's name was Mary. And he came to her and said, 'Greetings, favoured one! The Lord is with you.' But she was much perplexed by his words and pondered what sort of greeting this might be. The angel said to her, 'Do not be afraid, Mary, for you have found favour with God. And now, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you will name him Jesus. He will be great, and will be called the Son of the Most High, and the Lord God will give to him the throne of his ancestor David. He will reign over the house of Jacob for ever, and of his kingdom there will be no end.' Mary said to the angel, 'How can this be, since I am a virgin?' The angel said to her, 'The Holy Spirit will come upon you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you; therefore the child to be born will be holy; he will be called Son of God. And now, your relative Elizabeth in her old age has also conceived a son; and this is the sixth month for her who was said to be barren. For nothing will be impossible with God.' Then Mary said, 'Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word.' Then the angel departed from her.
