With the pictures that are painted of the religious leaders it is easy for us to forget that they were sincere in their religious beliefs, whole heartedly desiring to follow Gods commands as they understood them. This however was the source of so many conflicts, that we see play out during Jesus ministry. The danger here for us is real, at what point does tradition or an over confidence in our own righteousness become a stumbling block to others? Especially a stumbling block to others feeling the love and forgives of Jesus Christ through us? Can our lack of forgiveness me a stumbling block to people coming to church, or connecting into a fulfilling relationship with Christ.

PSALM 137

SECOND READING

A reading from the second letter to Timothy.

2 TIMOTHY 1.1-14

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus, To Timothy, my beloved child: Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord. I am grateful to God—whom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors did—when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands; for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice, but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline. Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, relying on the power of God, who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace. This grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Saviour Christ Jesus, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel.

For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day what I have entrusted to him. Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard the good treasure entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.

The Holy Gospel is written in the 17th Chapter of the Gospel according to Luke, beginning at the 1st verse.

Glory be to thee, O Lord

LUKE 17:1-10

Jesus said to his disciples, ‘Occasions for stumbling are bound to come, but woe to anyone by whom they come! It would be better for you if a millstone were hung around your neck and you were thrown into the sea than for you to cause one of these little ones to stumble. Be on your guard! If another disciple sins, you must rebuke the offender, and if there is repentance, you must forgive. And if the same person sins against you seven times a day, and turns back to you seven times and says, “I repent”, you must forgive.’ The apostles said to the Lord, ‘Increase our faith!’ The Lord replied, ‘If you had faith the size of a mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, “Be uprooted and planted in the sea”, and it would obey you. ‘Who among you would say to your slave who has just come in from ploughing or tending sheep in the field, “Come here at once and take your place at the table”?’

Would you not rather say to him, “Prepare supper for me, put on your apron and serve me while I eat and drink; later you may eat and drink”? Do you thank the slave for doing what was commanded? So you also, when you have done all that you were ordered to do, say, “We are worthless slaves; we have done only what we ought to have done!” ’

This is the Gospel of the Lord: **Praise be to thee, O Christ.**

"The Friends Bread Tag Project. To see what happens to the bread tags we are collecting, go to transmutation.com.au, and then to 'online store', and then 'Remade in Robe'. There is an amazing array of goods made with recycled bread tags. A total of 8 tonnes of plastic bread tags have now been processed, and have raised enough funds to provide another 3 wheelchairs for people in South Africa - a total of 66 wheelchairs. Transmutation's shop is located at 14 Flint Street Robe."
