Welcome to St Peter's Cathedral. We are delighted to have you worship with us today for this Choral Eucharist from A Prayer Book for Australia. Please join us in saying the words in bold. The hymns can be found in the separate hymn book. All indications for sitting, kneeling, and standing are a guide only: please do whatever is most comfortable for you.

St Peter's Cathedral resides on the lands of the Kaurna people. We give thanks for their ancestors and acknowledge the ongoing right and responsibility of their elders to care for this Country. We are committed to work and pray towards a more just settlement for all Indigenous people and pay our respect to First Nations people with us.

St Peter's Cathedral is a Christ-centred, sacramental, inclusive, thinking, mission-oriented faith community.

We gather on this First Sunday of Lent, inspired by Jesus' forty days and forty nights in the wilderness, spent in fasting and in prayer. As we reflect on that time, we may wish to spend our own time of Lent engaging in the traditional approaches of prayer, fasting and almsgiving.

In St Peter's Cathedral we are invited to give alms, by way of money for the ministry of the Cathedral, and food for those in need, in our "Giving Area" at the back of the Cathedral. Parishioners may well have charities close to their hearts to which they may wish to give a little extra during the Season of Lent.

God invites each one of us to prayer and fasting at this time and for each of us this will look different. From this week, the Cathedral offers study groups, a sermon series on forgiveness each Choral Evensong at 6pm on Sundays, Midday prayers on Tuesdays and Thursdays, and an online Children's time of Reflection each Wednesday at 4.30pm (also suitable for parents, grandparents and those who are children at heart!) We do hope you will find blessing here.

Lord, have mercy.


Keep in safety those who travel, and all who are in danger.

FIRST READING

A reading from the Book of Genesis

GENESIS 2.15-17; 3.1-7

The Lord God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it. And the Lord God commanded the man, 'You may freely eat of every tree of the garden; but of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil you shall not eat, for in the day that you eat of it you shall die.' Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the Lord God had made. He said to the woman, 'Did God say, "You shall not eat from any tree in the garden"?' The woman said to the serpent, 'We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; but God said, "You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die."

But the serpent said to the woman, 'You will not die; for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil.' So when the woman saw that the tree was good for food, and that it was a delight to the eyes, and that the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of its fruit and ate; and she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate. Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked; and they sewed fig leaves together and made loincloths for themselves.

PSALM 32

Blessed are those whose sin is forgiven: whose iniquity is put away.

Great tribulations remain for the ungodly:

but whoever puts their trust in the Lord, mercy embraces them on every side.

Rejoice in the Lord, you righteous, and be glad:

and shout for joy, all you that are true of heart.

SECOND READING

A reading from Paul's letter to the Romans

ROMANS 5.12-21

Therefore, just as sin came into the world through one man, and death came through sin, and so death spread to all because all have sinned— sin was indeed in the world before the law, but sin is not reckoned when there is no law. Yet death exercised dominion from Adam to Moses, even over those whose sins were not like the transgression of Adam, who is a type of the one who was to come. But the free gift is not like the trespass.

For if the many died through the one man's trespass, much more surely have the grace of God and the free gift in the grace of the one man, Jesus Christ, abounded for the many. And the free gift is not like the effect of the one man's sin. For the judgement following one trespass brought condemnation, but the free gift following many trespasses brings justification. If, because of the one man's trespass, death exercised dominion through that one, much more surely will those who receive the abundance of grace and the free gift of righteousness exercise dominion in life through the one man, Jesus Christ. Therefore just as one man's trespass led to condemnation for all, so one man's act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all. For just as by the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners, so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous. But law came in, with the result that the trespass multiplied; but where sin increased, grace abounded all the more, so that, just as sin exercised dominion in death, so grace might also exercise dominion through justification leading to eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.



MATTHEW 4.1-11

Then Jesus was led up by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil.

He fasted for forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was famished.

The tempter came and said to him, 'If you are the Son of God, command these stones to become loaves of bread.'

But he answered, 'It is written,

"One does not live by bread alone,

but by every word that comes from the mouth of God."'

Then the devil took him to the holy city and placed him on the pinnacle of the temple,

saying to him, 'If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down; for it is written, "He will command his angels concerning you",

and "On their hands they will bear you up,


THE GREAT THANKSGIVING



Yet pour out on us from heaven the grace of pardon for You are the forgiver of sins.

Pardon the evil we have done.

Give in even greater measure the grace we ask for, so that at last it may come about that we are pleasing to you in this life and the next.


Louis Verne (1870-1937) Prelude from Symphonie No. I

Cathedral Roof Maintenance – Work has commenced on the lower roof of the cathedral, above the clergy car parks. This will necessitate reallocation of car parking spaces for 10-16 weeks.
