

FROM THE DEAN



When I came to you, brothers and sisters, I did not come proclaiming the mystery of God to you in lofty words or wisdom. For I decided to know nothing among you except Jesus

Christ, and him crucified (1 Corinthians 2: 1 – 2).

Here is my second report since becoming Dean in 2021. The last year has been a busy year in the life of the Cathedral as we emerge from the restrictions brought upon us by Covid-19. We are returning to normal, and it is pleasing to see the attendance at worship increasing since the restrictions have been lifted. However, Covid-19 is still with us, and we still need to show a degree of caution.

Staff Changes

In last year's report I flagged that Kate Palmrose was to be leaving us after 10 years of exceptional service. Suzanne Wilson is currently our Cathedral Administrator. We have discovered that the role is very demanding and exceedingly complex. I thank Suzanne for her willingness to give it her best. The Cathedral Office staff has also seen the additions of our new front desk, Marco Callisto and Emma Simpson-Smith. Marco and Emma are growing into their roles, and they bring a freshness and vibrancy with them.

Clergy

Assistant Priest, the Rev'd Peter Jin, left us for St John's, Salisbury where he is presently priest in charge. We thank Peter for his service to the Cathedral and wish him every blessing in his new role. This year The Rev'd Sally Sandford-Morgan has joined the clergy team at 0.5 (Full Time Equivalent). Thankfully, the Cathedral is still a training parish. There are few left. I look back to my time as assistant curate to The Rev'd John Roderick and The Venerable Conrad Patterson at St David's, Burnside (1991 – 1994) as being crucially important in my formation as a priest. There is so much to learn, and we need well trained clergy in the diocese. I pray that Sally will enjoy her time with us.

I thanked Canon Jenny Wilson last year for her exceptional service to the Cathedral and loyal support. We are so blessed to have Canon Jenny with us as she brings an intimate knowledge of the Cathedral's life and well-honed skills in preaching and liturgy. I am also surrounded by 'wise ones', The Rev'd Dr Lynn Arnold AO and The Rev'd Joan Claring-Bould who as honorary assistants offer sacrificial service to the Cathedral community. They are complimented by our active retired clergy: The Rev'd Bill Goodes, The Rev'd Stephen Pash, The Rev'd Michael Hillier, and The Rev'd Stuart Langshaw who also acts as the Archbishop's Chaplain. Their ministry is greatly appreciated.

The pastoral work of the Cathedral is wonderfully supported by the Pastoral Visitors. I thank them for their care to the Cathedral community.

Worship

The most recent National Life Survey revealed that the Cathedral music is the major drawcard to the Cathedral's worship. None of us would be surprised by this. The Director of Music, Anthony Hunt, is very talented and dedicated. We are so lucky to have someone of his talent be involved in the life of the Cathedral. The choir is magnificent and the organist, David Heah, brilliant. The worship at the Cathedral is extraordinary. Many visitors remark on the beauty of our worship. Here I note the generous financial support and encouragement of the St Peter's Cathedral Music Foundation. I thank also all who are involved in our worship: servers, liturgical assistants, readers, preachers, celebrants, intercessors, sacristans, flower guild, stewards, needle work guild, bell ringers, Cathedral Kids, brass/silver polishers ... my apologies if I have left anyone out! While the Cathedral Shop, Tour Guides, and Welcomers are not part of the worship as such, they play an important role in making the Cathedral a place of hospitality and service. Your work is valued and appreciated.

Finances

As someone who has come to you recently, I have noticed that we run the Cathedral on a 'shoestring' budget for what we seek to offer and what is expected of us. My own view is that we are at least \$100,000 short on our income each year to what we need. The treasurer will give more accurate findings in his report. We need to give serious thought to income generation. Cutting the budget is not an option as this really means cutting our ministries; the very life blood of the Cathedral. Church-based finance is a complex issue, but we are giving some serious thought at Cathedral Council to income generation and how best we can do that. Our 'softly, softly' approach to the Planned Giving Programme saw a small increase for which we are very grateful. Please pray about this, and pray over your own level of financial giving and whether it could be increased.

I want to thank our treasurer, Kevin Stracey. Kevin has an enormous job as treasurer, which he fulfils in a voluntary capacity. He offers financial wisdom and guidance in our financial affairs, as well as serving the diocese in several capacities. Thank you Kevin you for all the work you do! Robyn Shilcock is also deeply appreciated for her work in the Cathedral Office looking after the financial bookkeeping.

St Cyprian's, Melbourne Street

One of the challenges facing the diocese is the provision of clergy to part-time appointments. There has been an increasing number of part-time parishes in recent decades. For a few decades now we have known that there will be fewer parishes with even fewer clergy to service them. This is now being felt across the diocese. This sounds all rather negative, but it does reflect the currently reality and this will only increase in the years to come.



In the context of this, an informal conversation has been occurring with St Cyprian's Melbourne St about them joining the Cathedral parish. As I write, St Cyprian's are now formally considering the proposal. If St Cyprian's decide that it is the best way forward for them, we will enter more formal discussions about how this may happen.

I think it will be a wonderful opportunity for us to support our brothers and sisters in Christ, and explore how we might be able encourage Christian ministry to that side of the parish. You never quite know what the Holy Spirit might have in mind!

Restoration and Maintenance

From time to time you will see scaffolding and work being done to various sections of the Cathedral. This is well known, of course, to those of you who have been members of the Cathedral for some time. Gerald Lipman has been working hard to raise funds for this much needed work. This is an ongoing project, but it is pleasing to have some of the restoration work done.

A maintenance group has been formed

under Marianne Judson's leadership. The Cathedral and grounds, as you can appreciate, require a lot of continual work and oversight. Thankyou to Marianne for her leadership in this and the emerging team that assists her in this work.

Future directions

The Cathedral Council last year put some time aside to draw up some strategic directions around Finance, Liturgy, Information Technology, and Mission. We will be experiencing the fruits of that reflection over the next few years. It is always important to look to the future in hope. There are number of challenges befalling the wider church and diocese, and we will not be exempt from these. However, God will always meet us in the future and guide our steps in the present.

Concluding Comments

I thank the Cathedral Council, together with the wardens, Kevin Stracey and Reuben Jacob, for their commitment and hard work. I would also like to thank all of you for your support of the Cathedral! Susan, my wife, has been an important support to me for over 32 years of ordained ministry. She has her own demanding ministry as Senior Chaplain (Health and Community) in the diocese, and joins in the life of the Cathedral as much as she is able. We particularly enjoy leading small groups together, and it was a pleasure to share something of our Lambeth Conference experience last year. The Archbishop, The Most Rev'd Geoff Smith, is very encouraging of the Cathedral's ministry, and it is always a pleasure to have him here in his own Cathedral.

The Archbishop and Lynn Smith will be offering a study programme at the Cathedral in April this year. I hope many of you will join in.

There were many highlights in 2022, including the Friends of the Cathedral's 90th Anniversary. Their support of the Cathedral is invaluable. We were honoured to have The Archbishop of Canterbury, The Most Rev'd and Rt Honourable Justin and Caroline Welby with us for the diocese's 175th anniversary. We were also honoured to host the Memorial Service for her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth the 2nd. I look forward to what 2023 has in store for us as we work to serve God together. Everything we do at the Cathedral is done in Christ's name and for one purpose, and that is to know Jesus Christ and him crucified.

The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit, be with us all evermore (2 Corinthians 13: 14).

Suzanne Wilson and Robyn Shilcock continued to take everything in their stride and keep the office going.

During the last year, the Cathedral Council came together and pondered on our Vision for the coming years and settled on four pillars: liturgy, mission, finance, and technology. Council members are leading projects to review and improve what the Cathedral offers in each of the four areas in consultation with the congregation. At Council, we said farewell to Kirsty Munro and thank her for her immense contributions to Council. We also welcomed Kathryn Dellit to Cathedral Council as the new nominee of Diocesan Council earlier this year and look forward to working with her as we move forward.


Our services have gone back to 'normal', and we look forward in hope to pursue the many opportunities that lie ahead and to a blessed future in 2023.


FROM THE TREASURER

It is a joy to be part of St Peter's Cathedral, and especially on Sundays to see such a varied worshipping community. As treasurer, it is my job to help ensure that the Dean and Cathedral Council have the financial resources in place to deliver our services, liturgical and otherwise, to the congregation and to the wider community in the diocese and city of Adelaide.

The Cathedral is not here to make a financial profit. But it does need to ensure that its income broadly matches its expenditure over the medium term. Looking back, from 2013 to 2020, we did break even consistently, and expenditure has been continued to hold steady throughout the ten-year period. But from 2020, the impact of Covid on visitor numbers, building hire and the suspension of open plate collections during services all had an impact on income. Furthermore, consistent increases in planned giving between 2017 and 2020 were also reversed. As a result, in 2021 and 2022 we saw a significant shortfall, resulting in the need to sell some of our investments.



A further shortfall of \$80,000 is budgeted for 2023, and we are already conscious of challenges which may cause that deficit to increase.



In my 2022 report, I wrote: "we are aware that as we look further ahead we will need to work towards a break-even outcome. However, this can only be achieved by the unpalatable option of reducing costs (which is really to say by reducing staff), or by addressing successfully the challenge of increasing income. I sincerely hope that we will be able to find ways of increasing our income so that we can continue to maintain and improve the Cathedral's ministry in future." These words are truer than ever with the sudden return of increased inflation.

The open plate has been reintroduced in Sunday services, and members of Cathedral Council are considering all possibilities for increasing income, including enhanced use of technology. It will also be essential to develop a strategy around the best use of the Cathedral's physical assets. However, at the most fundamental level the regular congregation needs to be able to pay for the ministry it receives, and we must focus in the first instance on the need to return to a significant positive trend in planned giving.

GROWING IN FAITH

Music

For 2022, the Cathedral Choir finally had a sense of "returning to normal" as the constant flow of restrictions since the start of the pandemic in 2020 began to ease. It feels like a long time ago, but it must be remembered that the choir was only able to remove masks while singing at Easter, in April 2022.

The year began with marking the death of Dr Francis Jackson at the age of 104; a musician with a great connection to St Peter's Cathedral through his old friend David Swale. The choir's first evensong of the year was in commemoration of Francis.

A week later and on February 6th we were celebrating the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II.

Having begun the year in commemoration, later in the year the choir performed great service to the city, their music being a centrepiece for the State Memorial Service for Queen Elizabeth on 20th September; the second service for Her Majesty, as a special evensong was held at short notice on the 9th September upon the news being received.

Shortly after, the choir returned during their usual school holidays for the honour of singing for the Archbishop of Canterbury. Such opportunities as this visit and the State Memorial Service are a great honour for the choir; and a reflection of their important function. Other musical highlights have included the premiere of eight new choral works over the course of the year: A Mass for Treble Voices, and a setting of Psalm 91 by Anthony Hunt; 'Respice exaudi me' and 'Do not remember the former things' by Rachel Bruerville (the latter commissioned for the 30th anniversary of the ordination of women); a substantial setting of Psalm 22 by Jodie O'Regan; a setting of the Transfiguration text 'O nata lux' by Cathedral organist David Heah; and two delightful Christmas arrangements of 'Away in Manger' by Anthony Hunt, and 'Silent Night' by Emma Simpson-Smith, sung at the crib service on Christmas Eve.



The choir has collaborated three times over the course of the year; combining with Christchurch North Adelaide for the visit of the Archbishop of Canterbury; singing the Duruflé 'Messe cum jubilo' with the Choir of Pilgrim Uniting Church, both at the Cathedral and at Pilgrim Church; and combining with the Adelaide Chamber Singers for the wedding of Cathedral organist David Heah. We hope to continue such collaborations regularly.



The Music Foundation continued to raise its profile, and the profile of the choral & organ music at St Peter's, through its Concert Series, which saw excellent concerts from soprano Jessica Dean, trumpeter David Elton, organist Thomas Wilson (St Mary's Cathedral Sydney), the Cathedral Choir and Consort, and organist Joshua van Konkelenberg and a Baroque orchestra. The music department remains extremely grateful to the Music Foundation for their ongoing and important support.

The choral Winter School, established in 2020, saw an increase in applicants, and is becoming an excellent vehicle for recruitment of junior choristers.

It has been a pleasure to enjoy the development of Marco Callisto, as our organ scholar, including opportunities for him to conduct; and we will welcome Charlie Wells as a second organ scholar in 2023. Through the music foundation we were delighted to support four young junior organ scholars in their first organ lessons, which will continue into 2023. Throughout the year, the playing of Cathedral organist David Heah must be commended. It is also worth acknowledging the many volunteers within the choir who help to run things providing music theory lessons to the trebles (pictured left), sight-reading lessons, organising robes, performing library duties etc.

We look forward to a busy and invigorating 2023.

Bellringers

2022 has been a promising year in the belltower, with several new learners coming along (although more ringers are always needed!) Several of our more experienced ringers have dedicated a lot of time in our Ringing Centre to train new learners up to the point where they will soon be able to ring for services.

The learners from previous years have all progressed well and now regularly ring for services adding to our band of dedicated ringers.

We have also been working at improving the skills and repertoire for our more experienced ringers with a programme of new methods (ringing patterns) for us to practice as a band to help both develop our ringing abilities and maintain a high level of interest. Associated with this the local ringers (with occasional interstate help) have rung 9 Quarter Peals and 3 Peals over the last 12 months, the most recent being a peal on 20th February 2023, exactly 60 years after the first peal on the St Peter's bells. David Bleby has the distinction of having rung in both of those peals, 60 years apart.



The death of Queen Elizabeth presented a few challenges in the tower, due to the traditional requirements for muffling and unmuffling the bells. Fortunately the bellringing community, aware of the Queen's advancing years, had been prepared for this eventuality. There were many trips into the belfry to install, remove and then re-install bell -muffles, but we were proud both to ring fully muffled to mourn the death of Queen Elizabeth, and to ring open to celebrate the ascension of King Charles.

Regarding bell-tower maintenance, there have been no issues over the last 12 months beyond the expected wear and tear: 2 broken stays and 1 broken rope, all in the Ringing Center, which we rapidly fixed with spares on hand.

Thanks to all of the ringers who have given their time to keep the bells ringing, and especially to those who have been training our newest ringers.

We look forward to another year of ringing, and all being well, a growing band of ringers.

Servers & Liturgy Team

Our team comprises thirty-six servers, aged from 80 down to 7. The longest serving started in June 1966; the newest in October 2022. Servers assist at nine regular acts of worship a week, plus special occasions – around 475 services a year.

This report focuses on some responsibilities of the Secretary as head server:

Recruitment happens in several ways. Positions are sometimes advertised, interested persons approach the clergy or the secretary, or the secretary looks out for newcomers with a church background as potential servers. This year four persons have begun serving at

our weekday Eucharists, following calls for applications. One of their tasks is to set up the tray of vessels, as pictured.



Training is generally on the job, starting with a 'walk-through' to observe at close hand what happens in the Sanctuary. Gradually the new server is trained to take on tasks during the service, with some instruction outside the service time. Care is taken to introduce the server to customs relating to posture, movement, gestures, the 'discipline of the hands', and the wearing of robes. These customs aim to minimise distractions to the worshippers in the pews.

CATHEDRAL KIDS

Many Cathedrals do not have a weekly program for young people .

Since the 1980s thanks to Father Ross Maroney (leader) and helpers David Wilson and Marlene Heah, we have our own Cathedral Kids program. At first it was held in the crypt and a small group attended regularly, many being siblings of choristers. We now meet in the CP Hall during the 10.30 service.

The year began with only a small group, with numbers affected by Covid uncertainty; but from April 2022 our numbers rose to double figures with more than 17 attending on Easter Day.

This continued with our older group (over 6 y.o.) increasing often. We have been lucky to have new families joining us for both older and younger groups. We are pleased to have so many regulars, as there are a lot of activities that compete with church on Sundays!

Before Christmas we celebrated Advent traditions, including St Nicholas Day This year we were able to have our children's service on Christmas Eve, not possible the previous year because of Covid. Many turned up and enjoyed dressing up as shepherds, angels, wise men and other nativity characters.

Our teaching team continued with Marlene, Louise, Gerald, Pamela and Deborah and extra helpers Cauthan and Favour.

Tour Leaders

The return to normalcy has been slow. Covid of course has taken its toll on this aspect of Cathedral life too, and at the start of the year we discussed the issue of masks, requiring people to wear masks or not, and how for some guides exposure to COVID prevented them from participating for a few months. In response to these circumstances I asked one of our number to act as Safety Officer, and he had a permanent place on our agenda, but as the year progressed the item became less necessary.

We were pleased to develop a 'Guide for the Guides' booklet which set out standards and protocols for existing and future Tour Guides. This was a worthwhile thing to do as it caused us to reflect on how we prepare for, and perform our role.

Traditionally, apart from Public Tours (which now occur only on Wednesdays, and not on Sundays post the 10.30 service), our main customer base has been Probus clubs, Retirement homes, Trade travel and other bus tours, and of course schools.

Last year, the word got about amongst Probus clubs that our cathedral was worth a visit, and our calendar ticked over nicely with clubs visiting from all parts of Adelaide. Sadly, the request from schools has diminished. The Dean and I undertook to write to a long data base of schools which had visited us in the past, but the response was muted. Part of the reason is the decline in the teaching of RAVE and RE in our schools. That said, we were delighted to welcome Year 4s, Year 10s, and Year 12 students from a variety of schools, Anglican and non-Anglican.

The History Festival (May) saw us host 8 morning tours, 4 of which were enhanced by an organ recital prior to the tour. The roll-up to these was quite small, reflecting caution amongst our client base.

My earnest thanks go to all our Tour Guides, and especially to our secretary Bill, my deputy Kay, and to Brian the Cathedral archivist who keeps us sharp and well-informed. We could not do what we do without the efficiency of Cathedral staff, especially Suzanne. Thank you to you all.

At the time of writing, the news broke of the death of our beloved Meredith Hercus. Meredith will be remembered for many contributions to Cathedral life. A Tour guide since 2009, she hosted public tours on the first Wednesday of the month, and of course conducted dozens of others over her long career as a volunteer guide. We feel her loss greatly, and she is much missed for her joy, enthusiasm, and knowledge.

STEWARDS

If 2020 was the year we went into Covid, with significant changes to our procedures for stewards, 2022-3 was the year we exited our Covid procedures, and went back to normal.

It's worthwhile to note these changes, as we forget so quickly.

- We eliminated need for masks;

- We stopped having sanitiser dispensers at the doors;

- We no longer need Covid marshals at each service;

- We stopped sanitising pews after the 8am service;

- The congregation was no longer spaced to limit infection;

- We started passing the collection plate at each service, and then counting the money and putting it in the safe.

We've lost 5-10 stewards who have retired, but they were replaced at the 10.30 service and 6pm service. We have gaps in our steward roster for the 8am Sunday service. 2-3 stewards are urgently needed for these services. With numbers low at the 8am service, a solution is not at hand.

Our Christmas and Easter services were back to usual, with 500 plus in the congregation. And of course we had all the regular services, school Christmas carols, concerts and funerals.

There were three services that are worth mentioning. The first was on the day of the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. Four stewards were required with four hours' notice. One week later we provided stewards for the State Memorial Service organised by SA Government. On 9th October we had a service where the Archbishop of Canterbury preached. The congregation included many from other parts of the Diocese.

The Stewards Handbook was updatedreduced from 95 pages to less than 20, and this was circulated to all the stewards. We had 4/5 training sessions with stewards, covering all three Sunday services, and those who want "personalised" instruction are invited to contact the coordinator.

We have had one meeting of all Team Leaders and the Dean.

The steward roster relies heavily on the goodwill of all stewards, and in the past twelve months we have had not one occasion where no stewards were available. As Coordinator, I express my thanks to every individual steward for their generous assistance.

HOSPITALITY TEAM

The Service to mark the Opening of the State Parliamentary year was held in the Cathedral on Thursday, 5th May, 2022 at 8 am, followed by a light refreshments served at the back of the Cathedral. Approximately 60 attended the Service, (the numbers affected by COVID), although fewer than 50 stayed for refreshments.

On the 3rd July, the Patronal Festival was celebrated with a Sausage Sizzle following the 10.30 am Service, with a good number attending, and many helpers providing assistance with setting up, cooking, providing salads, serving and cleaning up.

After a happy coffee and chat I had with Meredith Hercus in early November, and the handover of her meticulously kept records during her 8 years as team leader, the Team's first request came from Julie Doherty, Cathedral Shop Manager. Julie asked us to assist with homemade biscuits for the Cathedral congregation's morning tea for the Christmas Market in the C P Hall on Sunday, 20th November. Several dozen biscuits were provided, and some very appreciative comments received.



On Sunday, 4th December, the team provided refreshments following the 6pm Service on Sunday, 4th December, for the 30th Anniversary of the Ordination of Women. Although there was a significant congregation, only a relatively few stayed.

10.30AM TEA AND COFFEE

Between March 2020 and May 2022 we did not serve Tea and Coffee after the 10.30 service — the risks of Covid seemed to be too high. But as we approached mid-2022 we were more relaxed, and started to share hospitality once again. Initially this was done with an abundance of caution: servers with latex cloves, masks, and a Covid marshal present to ensure we kept 1.5 m from each other. We even served tea outside in the close, and coffee through the window. All to stop the pandemic from spreading.

From May to October we served tea and coffee every second week, but from mid October through to mid December, and from January 22 onwards we have been operating every week.

By February 2023 we are more relaxed no masks, and tea and coffee both served inside. But we have tried to simplify our service. We put out fewer tables and chairs; we serve beverages in mugs, not cups and saucers, and we don't put out cordial, just water.

The serving teams are mostly new since our pre-Covid days. We have two teams led by choir parents, which is great and we often have a group of young people who help picking up chairs and putting away the tables.

We are keen to get more volunteers to join our roster. The Fifth Sunday is totally missing a team, and some nonchoir parents would be helpful as backups. Please get in touch with me if you can assist.

Pre-Covid we received donations about \$5-7 per week, but we now get \$20-40 a week, and obviously we are grateful for your generosity.

Allowing our congregation to socialise after the 10.30am service is an important part of our community development. This is where we can greet newcomers and catch up with old friends. We thank you, the congregation for joining us week after week, but especially we thank those on the roster for making it happen.

THE MAGDALENE CENTRE Sunday Food Donations

Each week parishioners donate food for those in need to Anglicare where a small food bank is always available so that clients can stock up on the basics of toiletries and food. On a regular Sunday approximately five grocery bags are donated that I then take to be distributed to those in need at Anglicare on Gilbert street. The donations consist of food and personal care products. The donations delivered are received with great appreciation. At Christmas from November to December the donations often consist of goods to make the festive season more special.

Magdalene Centre Dinners

Last year on the 23 of July the Cathedral provided a meal for people in need at the Anglicare centre on Moore St. On the 10th of December we also hosted Anglicare's last meal of the year, the Christmas dinner. The July dinner was well received, the Cathedral provided a three course meal for over eighty people. We have changed the menu to allow for meals to be in the form of takeaway if necessary, to comply with new health restrictions and facilitate a Covid-safe environment. The Cathedral parishioners have kindly donated casseroles, cakes, and brownies as well as money so that a dinner can be provided. After some campaigning and outside sourcing of fundraising, I was able to raise a total of \$800 to provide an extraordinary Christmas dinner. This amazing amount allowed us to provide special festive foods and treats. As well

as the regular casseroles we provided Christmas hams, dinner rolls, puddings with custard or ice-cream, mince pie, Christmas mixed lollies, individual chocolates and special summer fruit. We decorated the table with Christmas crackers and cards from the Sunday school. We estimated we would be catering for 100 people and were surprised that there were at least that many people on the night as it was apparently one of the most attended Christmas dinners in the last few years. We are happy to report that the feedback was overwhelmingly positive with everyone who attended overjoyed and appreciative of the special festive night. Since Coronavirus we have struggled with a small group of 6 regular volunteers in the kitchen and would appreciate anyone else who would like to volunteer for the Cathedral nights. We have also been impacted by reduced donations of casseroles and are finding we must buy in extra food. Last year a supplier who in the past had provided us with fruit and vegetable donations withdrew his support and we now need to purchase these products using the cash donations. This extra cost and the general increase of grocery prices make financial donations highly appreciated.

MANAGING RESOURCES

CATHEDRAL CONSERVATION

While I have been heading up the conservation for three years, this is the first report I have made to the Vestry. Our responsibility has been to manage the Conservation of our cathedral building, in particular the 12-stage plan prepared by the Cathedral architect in 2016. At that time the work was costed at \$6.8 million.

Stage 1 (the roof over the organ) was done when the organ was shipped to UK in 2017-8. It was funded by the Diocese and Adelaide City Council ("ACC").

Stage 2 (the bracing of the Lantern) was done in 2020. This was also funded by the Diocese.

We had hoped that the Cathedral conservation might qualify as a Covid-Project in 2020-2022, and we approached both the Commonwealth and the SA Government without success; but we entered into an agreement with National Trust (SA) whereby donors would get a tax deduction for their gifts and in February 2022 we approached both our community and others in the community who had shown generosity to the Cathedral in the past.

In total in the past 18-24 months, we received \$164,000 from our community, from about 50 donors. In addition we received one very generous donation for \$1 million. At December 31 2022 we had \$955,000 in the National Trust account, and we had paid \$120,000 on repairs and other conservation work.

As I write this, I am expecting work on the carpark-side lower roof with a cost of \$160,000 to commence. We will receive a grant of \$60,000 from ACC to assist with this work. Further, we have requested a quote for a complete replacement of the slates from the Lady Chapel around to the St Barnabas Gate. This quote will probably exceed the balance in the National Trust account, and further funding from the Government, ACC, the Diocese, or our community will have to be considered. We will keep the community informed.

This report is submitted on behalf of our committee, Rick Sawers and Don Donlan, and Marianne Judson, Chair of the Cathedral Property Committee.

SAFE MINISTRY

Safe Ministry exists to ensure that our church environments, our spaces, leaders and culture, are safe. The Anglican Diocese of Adelaide aims to ensure that all people within its environments are free from harm or abuse. To achieve this, the Diocese has in place a Safe Ministry 'clearance' process, consisting of screening and online training. This applies to all clergy, those licensed by the Bishop, paid church workers, and volunteers serving in any prescribed capacity within a church or related entity.

St Peter's Cathedral participates fully in this process, and there are currently 49 staff and volunteers in the parish holding a Safe Ministry clearance, with a number of others in the process of screening and training. A list of those holding a clearance is displayed in the Cathedral office.

PROPERTY

The Property Committee was reactivated in August 2022 and a team of willing workers is growing in numbers. Regular maintenance schedules are being re-established after the upheaval of Covid and staffing changes in the office.
