



SACRED SULLIVAN – CHORAL EVENSONG

6PM SUNDAY 14TH MAY 2023 - THE SIXTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

The St Peter's Cathedral Choir and the State Opera of South Australia are proud to collaborate during this Gilbert & Sullivan Festival, to present a service of Choral Evensong featuring the music of Arthur Sullivan.

Sullivan's enduring legacy is left to the theatre, through his partnership with the lyricist W.S. Gilbert, and the comic operettas created for D'Oyly Carte and the Savoy Theatre. However, Sullivan composed a great deal of other music, from cantatas to orchestral works, including many sacred choral works and hymn tunes. It is this alternate legacy of Arthur Sullivan we explore, in the familiar setting of Choral Evensong.

Choral Evensong is a service which dates back hundreds of years. Its roots are in the monastic traditions of the church, and is a tradition that in many cathedrals continues as a daily offering of music and words. The service is led by the choir, allowing us to experience a moment of reflection, meditation and beauty as the day draws to a close. St Peter's Cathedral holds Choral Evensong every Sunday at 6pm, sung by the Cathedral Choir with the Cathedral Organ. We hope that you find something special in this unique setting.

Phos Hilaron is an ancient Christian hymn dating back to the 3rd or 4th Century, originally to be sung at the lighting of lamps in the evening, which became part of the monastic service of Vespers, on which the Anglican service of Evensong is based. This text was set by Sullivan as part of his Cantata "The Golden Legend", a large scale orchestral and choral setting of the epic poem by Henry Longfellow. As Sullivan's most successful work outside his operettas, performances of this piece became so popular that Sullivan himself issued a moratorium on further performances.

This psalm chant has a curious story. It was discovered in an old chant book in the church of St George's Berlin (Berlin has had an Anglican church since at least 1830.) Whilst the chant was discovered in 2007, it was not until 2011 that director of music Andrew Sims realised the significance of this one short, simple chant — that it was the only chant ever composed by Arthur Sullivan. The only other existing copy of this chant is an original postcard, on the back of which Sullivan hastily scrawled the chant, with the accompanying words "My first and only chant!" It was commissioned by the organist of the church, Richard Thiele, perhaps at the request of the Crown Princess, in 1887.

The chant is simple, short, and indeed is possibly a deliberate pastiche of a "not very good chant!" It is possible that Sullivan's attitude suggested he didn't really want to compose this, but felt he had little choice. We may never know the full story of why this was written on the back of a postcard - it remains a curious footnote amongst Sullivan's sacred compositions.

FIRST LESSON

A reading from the Prophet Isaiah

ISAIAH 43.1-4

MAGNIFICAT

Surprisingly, for an English musician producing much music for the church, Arthur Sullivan never composed a setting of the Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis (the Canticles sung at every service of Evensong.) He was commissioned to write settings, but they never eventuated. In his letters, Sullivan writes "It is a shame and humiliation to confess it, but I **cannot** set the Magnificat. I tried it before, years ago when I wrote my little service in D, but I broke down and only set the Morning Service. I have covered pages with sketches but I hate them all. ... my endeavours are fruitless. Pray forgive me. I can't help it. ...all my efforts are weak and unworthy of the object." Here instead we choose a modern setting of the Magnificat (the Song of Mary), paired with a hymn tune which Sullivan arranged. Sullivan took an otherwise plodding and unremarkable tune, and with some clever re-harmonisation, turned it into a wonderfully satisfying hymn.

SECOND LESSON

A reading from the Gospel according to Matthew

MATTHEW 6:19-21, 25-29

'Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.

'Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothing? Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life? And why do you worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these.'

Here endeth the second lesson.

Without a Nunc Dimittis from Sullivan's pen, we turn to his primary inspiration. Sullivan's music is infused with the influence of Mendelssohn. Mendelssohn died in 1847, and nine years later, a 14-year-old Sullivan was the recipient of the inaugural Mendelssohn Scholarship to the Royal Academy of Music in London. This covered not only his study in London, but a year of study at the Leipzig Conservatoire, which Mendelssohn founded, training in Mendelssohn's ideas and techniques (indeed an admittedly conservative schooling in composition.)
