FIRST READING

EXODUS 33.12-23

A reading from the Book of Exodus.

Moses said to the Lord, "See, you have said to me, 'Bring up this people,' but you have not let me know whom you will send with me. Yet you have said, 'I know you by name, and you have also found favour in my sight.' Now if I have found favour in your sight, please show me your ways, so that I may know you and find favour in your sight. Consider too that this nation is your people." He said, "My presence will go with you, and I will give you rest." And he said to him, "If your presence will not go, do not bring us up from here. For how shall it be known that I have found favour in your sight, I and your people, unless you go with us? In this way, we shall be distinct, I and your people, from every people on the face of the earth."

The Lord said to Moses, "I will do this thing that you have asked, for you have found favour in my sight, and I know you by name." Moses said, "Please show me your glory." And he said, "I will make all my goodness pass before you and will proclaim before you the name, 'The Lord,' and I will be gracious to whom I will be gracious and will show mercy on whom I will show mercy. But," he said, "you cannot see my face, for no one shall see me and live." And the Lord continued, "See, there is a place by me where you shall stand on the rock, and while my glory passes by I will put you in a cleft of the rock, and I will cover you with my hand until I have passed by; then I will take away my hand, and you shall see my back, but my face shall not be seen."

SECOND READING

1 THESSALONIANS 1.1-10

The beginning of the letter of Paul to the Thessalonians.

Paul, Silvanus, and Timothy, To the church of the Thessalonians in God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ: Grace to you and peace.

We always give thanks to God for all of you and mention you in our prayers, constantly remembering before our God and Father your work of faith and labour of love and steadfastness of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ. For we know, brothers and sisters beloved by God, that he has chosen you, because our message of the gospel came to you not in word only but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and with full conviction; just as you know what kind of persons we proved to be among you for your sake. And you became imitators of us and of the Lord, for in spite of persecution you received the word with joy from the Holy Spirit, so that you became an example to all the believers in Macedonia and in Achaia. For the word of the Lord has sounded forth from you not only in Macedonia and Achaia but in every place your faith in God has become known, so that we have no need to speak about it. For they report about us what kind of welcome we had among you and how you turned to God from idols to serve a living and true God and to wait for his Son from heaven, whom he raised from the dead—Jesus, who rescues us from the coming wrath.

THE GOSPEL

MATTHEW 22.15-33

The Lord be with you.
And with thy spirit.

The Holy Gospel is written in the 22nd Chapter of the Gospel according to St Matthew beginning at verse 15.

Glory be to thee, O Lord.

The Pharisees plotted to entrap Jesus in what he said. So they sent their disciples to him, along with the Herodians, saying, “Teacher, we know that you are sincere, and teach the way of God in accordance with truth, and show deference to no one, for you do not regard people with partiality. Tell us, then, what you think. Is it lawful to pay taxes to Caesar or not?” But Jesus, aware of their malice, said, “Why are you putting me to the test, you hypocrites? Show me the coin used for the tax.” And they brought him a

denarius. Then he said to them, “Whose head is this and whose title?” They answered, “Caesar’s.” Then he said to them, “Give therefore to the Caesar the things that are Caesar’s and to God the things that are God’s.” When they heard this, they were amazed, and they left him and went away.

The same day some Sadducees came to him saying there is no resurrection, and they asked him a question: “Teacher, Moses said, ‘If a man dies childless, his brother shall marry the widow, and raise up children for his brother.’ Now there were seven brothers among us; the first married and died childless, leaving the widow to his brother. The second did the same, so also the third, down to the seventh. Last of all, the woman herself died. In the resurrection, then, whose wife of the seven will she be? For all of them had married her.”

Jesus answered them, “You are wrong because you know neither the scriptures nor the power of God. For in the resurrection people neither marry nor are given in marriage but are like angels of God in heaven. And as for the resurrection of the dead, have you not read what was said to you by God, ‘I am the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob’? He is God not of the dead but of the living.” And when the crowds heard it, they were astounded at his teaching.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

"There are no winners in war ..."

Anglicans in Development (through the Anglican Board of Mission, Australia) has launched an emergency appeal for the Al Ahli Hospital in Gaza.

The Al-Ahli Arab Hospital was founded by the Church of England's Church Missionary Society in 1882 and is one of the oldest hospitals in Gaza. Today it is a missionary activity of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem in the province the Episcopal Church of Jerusalem and the Middle East.

As the terrible events in Gaza have unfolded in the past two weeks, the hospital was hit by rockets on the evening of Saturday 17 October. The hospital had not only been providing medical support, but its car park and open areas also served as a shelter for thousands of residents who fled their homes in northern Gaza.

Now we learn of a massive, fatal strike on the Hospital. Initial estimates suggest the death toll is at least 200 people, but possibly more than 500 people have been killed.

In spite of the devastation, the hospital remains a beacon of hope to those trying to remain alive under dire circumstances," Archbishop Hosam of the Episcopal Church in Jerusalem and the Middle East said, "Please circulate this appeal as widely as possible, so that our hospital can be in a position to extend emergency medical services to those casualties caught in the crossfire."

The most desperate needs at present, which the appeal will directly fund, include:

- Urgent Medicines: \$55,000
- Medical Consumables: \$40,000
- ICU Equipment: \$32,000
- Fuel (10,000 Litres): \$27,000
- Extra staff: \$47,000
- Psychosocial Support for Patients and their families: \$24,000
- Food for patients and IDPs: \$21,000
