A SERVICE OF LIGHT

Please kneel/sit

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God and the Word was God. In him was life, and the life was the light of all.

As you have conducted us through the day and brought us to night's beginning, keep us now in Christ; grant us a peaceful evening and a night free from sin; and, at the end, bring us to everlasting life. Through Christ and in the Holy Spirit, we offer you all glory, honor, and worship, now and forever. **Amen.**

The following portion of Psalm 141 is said responsorially. During this time the High Altar candles are lit.

THE READING

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews.

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. Indeed, by faith our ancestors received approval. By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was made from things that are not visible.

By faith Abel offered to God a more acceptable sacrifice than Cain's. Through this he received approval as righteous, God himself giving approval to his gifts; he died, but through his faith he still speaks. By faith Enoch was taken so that he did not experience death, and "he was not found, because God had taken him." For it was attested before he was taken away that "he had pleased God." And without faith it is impossible to please him, for whoever would approach God must believe that he exists and that he rewards those who seek him. By faith Noah, warned by God about events as yet unseen, respected the warning and built an ark to save his household; by this he condemned the world and became an heir to the righteousness that is in accordance with faith.

By faith Abraham obeyed when he was called to set out for a place that he was to receive as an inheritance, and he set out, not knowing where he was going. By faith he stayed for a time in the land he had been promised, as in a foreign land, living in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. For he looked forward to the city that has foundations, whose architect and builder is God. By faith, with Sarah's involvement, he received power of procreation, even though he was too old, because he considered him faithful who had promised. Therefore from one person, and this one as good as dead, descendants were born, "as many as the stars of heaven and as the innumerable grains of sand by the seashore."

All of these died in faith without having received the promises, but from a distance they saw and greeted them. They confessed that they were strangers and foreigners on the earth, for people who speak in this way make it clear that they are seeking a homeland. If they had been thinking of the land that they had left behind, they would have had opportunity to return. But as it is, they desire a better homeland, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; indeed, he has prepared a city for them.

THE PSALM

Create in me a clean heart, O God: and renew a right spirit within me. Do not cast me out from your presence: do not take your holy spirit from me. O give me the gladness of your help again: and support me with a willing spirit. PSALM 51.10-17

Then will I teach transgressors your ways: and sinners shall turn to you again. O Lord God of my salvation, deliver me from bloodshed: and my tongue shall sing of your righteousness. O Lord, open my lips: and my mouth shall proclaim your praise. You take no pleasure in sacrifice, or I would give it: burnt-offerings you do not want. The sacrifice of God is a broken spirit: a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise.

We pray for those cut off by age, by disability, by thoughtlessness We pray for those cut off from family, from neighbours, from God.

O breath of God, breathe upon these that they may live.

God of hope, we thank you for the promise of restoration, of a new day and a new life: Thanks be to God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.

May God, the source of hope, fill you with all joy and peace by means of your faith in him, so that your hope will continue to grow by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Ash Wednesday is on 14 February. In addition to the regular celebrations of the Eucharist at 7:30 am and 10 am (BCP), there will be a Choral Eucharist with the blessing and imposition of ashes at 6 pm. The ashes used on this day are made from burning palm crosses from the previous year. There are baskets near the doors for returned crosses from past years.

Lent Study 2024 – A Truth Universally Acknowledged. Ash Wednesday is on 14 February, and our studies will commence in the following week. The Lent Study is based on a book A Truth Universally Acknowledged by the Venerable Dr Rachel Mann.

Dr Mann introduces Jane Austen, her world and her ideas, and for each day of Lent offers commentary on a short excerpt from Austen's writing to explore how her faith can illuminate ours. Our initial order of 50 copies of the book was exhausted last week, but further copies have now been received and are available through the Cathedral Shop for \$25.

Study groups are scheduled for Monday at 10 am (Jenny Wilson), Monday at 7 pm (Lynn Arnold) and Tuesday at 5 pm (Bishop Chris), but the Monday evening group is likely to be changed to Thursday at the same time. This is convenient for those who have registered, but perhaps that time would be suitable for some others who would not otherwise be able to attend.
