Welcome to St Peter's Cathedral. We are delighted to have you worship with us today for this service of Compline. Compline, from a Latin word meaning 'completion', is the final prayer liturgy of the day in the Christian tradition of canonical 'hours' or times of prayer. It is a time to entrust the night to God. At the heart of Compline is the verse from Psalm 31, "In manus tuas, Domine, commendo spiritum meum" (Into your hands, Lord, I commend my spirit) – a sign of complete surrender to God, and a deep trust and acknowledgement that our lives are ultimately in God's care.

This evening's offering of Compline follows the order observed in the Western Church from medieval times. Compline was normally chanted to plainsong, but was sometimes set for choirs and instruments, when it was sung as a public devotion, especially in Lent, and on major festivals. Settings of this nature are unusual for being offered almost entirely by the choir on behalf of all the people. There are nonetheless some parts of the service where the congregation is invited to sing or say responses **in bold type**. Indications for sitting, kneeling, and standing are a guide only.

This evening we welcome Syntony Chamber Choir to lead us in a liturgical performance of Compline set to music by the Italian Baroque composer Giovanni Legrenzi (1626-1690). Legrenzi's music has long been heard in the Cathedral, including many first modern performances of his music, as a result of the research done into his life and music by former Organist and Master of the Choristers Dr David Swale.

St Peter's Cathedral resides on the lands of the Kurna people. We give thanks for their ancestors and acknowledge the ongoing right and responsibility of their elders to care for this Country. We are committed to work and pray towards a more just settlement for all Indigenous people and pay our respect to First Nations people with us.

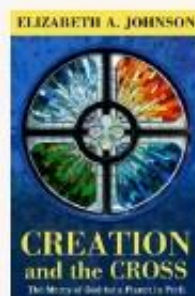
