

SUNG EUCHARIST THE 8TH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST 14 JULY 2024 10:30 AM

Welcome to St Peter's Cathedral. We are delighted to have you worship with us today for this Eucharist from A Prayer Book for Australia. Please join us in saying the words in bold. The hymns can be found in the separate hymn book. All indications for sitting, kneeling, and standing are a guide only: please do whatever is most comfortable for you.

St Peter's Cathedral resides on the lands of the Kaurna people. We give thanks for their ancestors and acknowledge the ongoing right and responsibility of their elders to care for this Country. We are committed to work and pray towards a more just settlement for all Indigenous people and pay our respect to First Nations people with us.

St Peter's Cathedral is a Christ-centred, sacramental, inclusive, thinking, mission-oriented faith community.

In the context of our liturgy within a fine church building it is easy to forget that the Bible comes to us from a time long ago and in a context far from our own. Many of the Biblical texts we have in our Sunday readings are of the timider type and the more challenging texts are dealt with in other places. However, this morning we have the challenging text of David dancing naked apart from a linen ephod, and Herod's step daughter dancing provocatively before his guests. Hardly the sort of thing Anglicans expect on a Sunday morning. However, it is a reminder of the earthiness of our Scriptures and the need to understand them contextually. In David we have a far from perfect leader, and in Herod an even weaker leader. They both remind us of the limitations found within all of us, especially those who claim to lead us, and the need for us to be discerning in who we choose to follow.





FIRST READING

2 SAMUEL 6.1-5, 12B-19

A reading from the second book of Samuel.

David again gathered all the chosen men of Israel, thirty thousand. David and all the people with him set out and went from Baale-judah, to bring up from there the ark of God, which is called by the name of the Lord of hosts who is enthroned on the cherubim. They carried the ark of God on a new cart, and brought it out of the house of Abinadab, which was on the hill. Uzzah and Ahio, the sons of Abinadab, were driving the new cart with the ark of God; and Ahio went in front of the ark. David and all the house of Israel were dancing before the Lord with all their might, with songs and lyres and harps and tambourines and castanets and cymbals.

So David went and brought up the ark of God from the house of Obed-edom to the city of David with rejoicing; and when those who bore the ark of the Lord had gone six paces, he sacrificed an ox and a fatling. David danced before the Lord with all his might; David was girded with a linen ephod. So David and all the house of Israel brought up the ark of the Lord with shouting, and with the sound of the trumpet.

As the ark of the Lord came into the city of David, Michal daughter of Saul looked out of the window, and saw King David leaping and dancing before the Lord and she despised him in her heart.

They brought in the ark of the Lord, and set it in its place, inside the tent that David had pitched for it; and David offered burnt-offerings and offerings of well-being before the Lord. When David had finished offering the burnt-offerings and the offerings of well-being, he blessed the people in the name of the Lord of hosts, and distributed food among all the people, the whole multitude of Israel, both men and women, to each a cake of bread, a portion of meat, and a cake of raisins. Then all the people went back to their homes.

The beginning of the letter to the Ephesians.

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, To the saints who are in Ephesus and are faithful in Christ Jesus: Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, just as he chose us in Christ before the foundation of the world to be holy and blameless before him in love. He destined us for adoption as his children through Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of his will, to the praise of his glorious grace that he freely bestowed on us in the Beloved. In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace that he lavished on us. With all wisdom and insight he has made known to us the mystery of his will, according to his good pleasure that he set forth in Christ, as a plan for the fullness of time, to gather up all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth. In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; this is the pledge of our inheritance towards redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

THE GOSPEL MARK 6.14-29

The Lord be with you.

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.



King Herod heard of Jesus' healings and other miracles, for Jesus' name had become known. Some were saying, 'John the baptizer has been raised from the dead; and for this reason these powers are at work in him.' But others said, 'It is Elijah.' And others said, 'It is a prophet, like

one of the prophets of old.' But when Herod heard of it, he said, 'John, whom I beheaded, has been raised.'

For Herod himself had sent men who arrested John, bound him, and put him in prison on account of Herodias, his brother Philip's wife, because Herod had married her. For John had been telling Herod, 'It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife.' And Herodias had a grudge against him, and wanted to kill him. But she could not, for Herod feared John, knowing that he was a righteous and holy man, and he protected him. When he heard him, he was greatly perplexed; and yet he liked to listen to him. But an opportunity came when Herod on his birthday gave a banquet for his courtiers and officers and for the leaders of Galilee. When his daughter Herodias came in and danced, she pleased Herod and his guests; and the king said to the girl, 'Ask me for whatever you wish, and I will give it.' And he solemnly swore to her, 'Whatever you ask me, I will give you, even half of my kingdom.' She went out and said to her mother, 'What should I ask for?' She replied, 'The head of John the baptizer.' Immediately she rushed back to the king and requested, 'I want you to give me at once the head of John the Baptist on a platter.' The king was deeply grieved; yet out of regard for his oaths and for the guests, he did not want to refuse her. Immediately the king sent a soldier of the guard with orders to bring John's head. He went and beheaded him in the prison, brought his head on a platter, and gave it to the girl. Then the girl gave it to her mother. When his disciples heard about it, they came and took his body, and laid it in a tomb.







Today we celebrate the success of our first Mission projects for the year. The AnglicareSA Solar Panel project is a major project to provide solar panel installations on community housing, with the ability for excess power to be consolidated and shared. We aimed for a target of at least \$5,000, to be increased considerably by the philanthropic support of two donors who will both match funding up to an amount of \$5,000; with AnglicareSA to further match the total raised. So \$5,000 raised by the Cathedral community would generate \$30,000, enough for six complete installations that will benefit not only the residents of the properties but additional residents where the infrastructure for power sharing exists. As of 30 June we raised in excess of \$13,500. With matched donor funding, this becomes \$23,500 before AnglicareSA additional matched funding brings the total to \$47,000. Thanks be to God!

Today we also celebrate the second of our small projects for the first half of the year, supporting the Magdalene Centre in the provision of socks and underwear for those in need. Underwear is an under-donated, yet most needed, item of clothing. No one should be deprived of the simple daily necessity of clean underwear that many of us take for granted. Hygiene and physical comfort are a part of this basic human need, and provide dignity and self-esteem. **Thank you** to Julie Doherty for her organisation of the project and to all who donated.

The Cathedral has a Mission Action Plan which documents the ways in which we are being called to participate in God's mission. This is a living document, and is regularly reviewed. The Cathedral Council will be focussing on this in July and August, and every member of the community is invited to contribute their ideas, and to pray about how we might grow in discipleship and share the good news. Please speak to any member of the Cathedral Council.
