Welcome to St Peter's Cathedral. We are delighted to have you worship with us today for this Choral Eucharist from A Prayer Book for Australia. Please join us in saying the words in bold. The hymns can be found in the separate hymn book. All indications for sitting, kneeling, and standing are a guide only: please do whatever is most comfortable for you.

St Peter's Cathedral resides on the lands of the Kaurna people. We give thanks for their ancestors and acknowledge the ongoing right and responsibility of their elders to care for this Country. We are committed to work and pray towards a more just settlement for all Indigenous people and pay our respect to First Nations people with us.

St Peter's Cathedral is a Christ-centred, sacramental, inclusive, thinking, mission-oriented faith community.

Welcome to St Peter's Cathedral for the Fifth Sunday in Lent.

In keeping with Lent as a time of 'giving up', our readings today talk about giving things up in trust that what God offers us in return surpasses any scarcity we might suffer now. St Paul gives up a secure social standing and a glittering career because he wanted to be united with Christ. Mary of Bethany offers up an extravagantly expensive perfume to honour Christ, and to, like St Paul, unite herself with Christ in his impending death and resurrection.

These readings encourage us in our Lenten journey. The scarcities we suffer unwillingly now, or the Lenten sacrifices we might have chosen to make will soon be eclipsed in the coming joy of Easter.

FIRST READING

ISAIAH 43.16-21

A reading from the prophet Isaiah.

Thus says the Lord, who makes a way in the sea, a path in the mighty waters, who brings out chariot and horse, army and warrior; they lie down, they cannot rise, they are extinguished, quenched like a wick: Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert. The wild animals will honour me, the jackals and the ostriches; for I give water in the wilderness, rivers in the desert, to give drink to my chosen people,

the people whom I formed for myself so that they might declare my praise.

PSALM 126 Chant: George Talbot (1875-1918)

When the Lord turned again the fortunes of Zion: then were we like those restored to life.
Then was our mouth filled with laughter: and our tongue with singing.
Then said they among the heathen: 'The Lord has done great things for them.'
Truly the Lord has done great things for us: and therefore we rejoiced.
Turn again our fortunes, O Lord: as the streams return to the dry south.
Those who sow in tears: shall reap with songs of joy.
They that go out weeping, bearing the seed: shall come again in gladness, bringing their sheaves with them.

SECOND READING PHILIPPIANS 3.3-14

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Philippians.

It is we who are the circumcision, who worship in the Spirit of God and boast in Christ Jesus and have no confidence in the flesh— even though I, too, have reason for confidence in the flesh.

If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.

Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining

forward to what lies ahead, I press on towards the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

THE GOSPEL JOHN 12.1-8

Six days before the Passover Jesus came to Bethany, the home of Lazarus, whom he had raised from the dead. There they gave a dinner for him. Martha served, and Lazarus was one of those at the table with him. Mary took a pound of costly perfume made of pure nard, anointed Jesus' feet, and wiped them with her hair. The house was filled with the fragrance of the perfume. But Judas Iscariot, one of his disciples (the one who was about to betray him), said, 'Why was this perfume not sold for three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor?' (He said this not because he cared about the poor, but because he was a thief; he kept the common purse and used to steal what was put into it.) Jesus said, 'Leave her alone. She bought it so that she might keep it for the day of my burial. You always have the poor with you, but you do not always have me.'

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

and the life of the world to come. Amen.




