Welcome to St Peter's Cathedral. We are delighted to have you worship with us today for this service of Night Prayer.

Please join us in saying the words in bold. The hymns can be found in the separate red hymn book. All indications for sitting, kneeling, and standing are a guide only.

St Peter's Cathedral resides on the lands of the Kaurna people. We give thanks for their ancestors, and acknowledge the ongoing right and responsibility of their elders to care for this Country. We are committed to work and pray towards a more just settlement for all Indigenous people and pay our respect to First Nations people with us.

Last Sunday we celebrated Christ Risen in the wake of the sombre reflection of Christ's profound sacrifice which we had solemnly commemorated two days earlier on Good Friday. The Friday just passed was another day of solemnity, ANZAC Day, when we reflected upon those who have fallen in war; not just WWI but any conflict which has seen lives lost in living memory or just beyond. Sometimes, the ongoing toll of lives through human conflict seems to suggest that Christ's message that we 'love one another as I have loved you' seems something of a forlorn hope. How should we reflect on this sabbath day after ANZAC Day as we continue in the divine power of the Easter Season?

A SERVICE OF THE LIGHT

Please kneel/sit

Arise, shine; for your light has come, and the glory of the Lord has risen upon you.

ISAIAH 60.1

A reading from the prophet Micah.

THE SECOND READING

JOHN 10.1-21

A reading from the Gospel according to John.

Jesus said to the Pharisees: 'Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers.' Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

So again Jesus said to them, 'Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.

'I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father.'
