

# CHORAL EVENSONG THE 6TH SUNDAY OF EASTER SUNDAY 18 MAY 2025

**6** PM

Welcome to St Peter's Cathedral. We are delighted to have you worship with us today for this service of Choral Evensong from the Book of Common Prayer. As the clergy and choir lead this service, allow the words and music to bring you into a stillness and prayerful reflection with God. Please join us in saying the words in bold. The hymns can be found in the separate hymn book. Indications for sitting, kneeling, and standing are a guide only.

St Peter's Cathedral resides on the lands of the Kaurna people. We give thanks for their ancestors and acknowledge the ongoing right and responsibility of their elders to care for this Country. We are committed to work and pray towards a more just settlement for all Indigenous people and pay our respect to First Nations people with us.

# St Peter's Cathedral is a Christ-centred, sacramental, inclusive, thinking, mission-oriented faith community.

As often is the case our readings and psalm contain some fairly violent images. Tonight's readings all end in a positive manner, but this is not always the case, particularly, but not exclusively, the readings from the Old Testament.

There are times when I wonder what visitors who have come with an enquiring mind, make of all the violence and negativity contained in our readings to which we say "This is the Word of the Lord" or "Thanks be to God".

In our newspaper and online news there is an even greater focus on violence, antisocial behaviour, wars, natural disasters, and threats of economic instability. This is enough to make many avoid any kind of news reporting because of the anxiety it causes.

Yet our readings do not leave us in despair. The psalm puts forward a way which will lead God's people to avoid punishment, the first reading ends with Barnabas and Paul guided by the Holy Spirit proclaiming the word of God and in the second reading God promises a place on his throne if the lukewarm Laodiceans repent.

In the end, goodness is stronger than evil and God's love is greater than our sin and fear.

THE FIRST LESSON ACTS 12.20-13.5

The lesson from the Acts of the Apostles, chapter 12, beginning at verse 20.

Herod was angry with the people of Tyre and Sidon. So they came to him in a body; and after winning over Blastus, the king's chamberlain, they asked for a reconciliation, because their country depended on the king's country for food. On an appointed day Herod put on his royal robes, took his seat on the platform, and delivered a public address to them. The people kept shouting, 'The voice of a god, and not of a mortal!' And immediately, because he had not given the glory to God, an angel of the Lord struck him down, and he was eaten by worms and died.

But the word of God continued to advance and gain adherents. Then after completing their mission Barnabas and Saul returned to Jerusalem and brought with them John, whose other name was Mark.

Now in the church at Antioch there were prophets and teachers: Barnabas, Simeon who was called Niger, Lucius of Cyrene, Manaen a member of the court of Herod the ruler, and Saul. While they were worshipping the Lord and fasting, the Holy Spirit said, 'Set apart for me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them.' Then after fasting and praying they laid their hands on them and sent them off.

So, being sent out by the Holy Spirit, they went down to Seleucia; and from there they sailed to Cyprus. When they arrived at Salamis, they proclaimed the word of God in the synagogues of the Jews. And they had John also to assist them.

The lesson from the book of Revelation, chapter 3, beginning at verse 14.

'To the angel of the church in Laodicea write: The words of the Amen, the faithful and true witness, the origin of God's creation:

'I know your works; you are neither cold nor hot. I wish that you were either cold or hot. So, because you are lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I am about to spit you out of my mouth. For you say, "I am rich, I have prospered, and I need nothing." You do not realize that you are wretched, pitiable, poor, blind, and naked. Therefore I counsel you to buy from me gold refined by fire so that you may be rich; and white robes to clothe you and to keep the shame of your nakedness from being seen; and salve to anoint your eyes so that you may see. I reprove and discipline those whom I love. Be earnest, therefore, and repent. Listen! I am standing at the door, knocking; if you hear my voice and open the door, I will come in to you and eat with you, and you with me. To the one who conquers I will give a place with me on my throne, just as I myself conquered and sat down with my Father on his throne. Let anyone who has an ear listen to what the Spirit is saying to the churches.'
