

Tea/coffee after worship: Our community offers hospitality at the following times:

- The Wednesday 10 am community have tea and coffee after the first Wednesday each month. The next gathering will take place on Wednesday 2 July.

Roofing Works: During the works to renew the roofing of the lower transept, there may be some unscheduled changes to our weekday services.

Meeting God on Mondays: On Monday 16th June, the Monday Study Group will gather with Canon Jenny in the CP Hall at 10am. We will begin by praying the Examen or Review of the Day. As we are in the Season of Pentecost, the group will also reflect on the story of the sending of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. All are welcome.

A New Psalter 2025 Trial: In 2017, General Synod passed a motion for the Liturgy Commission to develop a new liturgical psalter. The psalter project was proposed by Rev'd Associate Professor Matthew Anstey, who undertook to prepare the translation. Dr Anstey is an internationally recognised Biblical Hebrew scholar and parish priest at St Theodore's, Toorak Gardens. As is typically the case with new liturgical resources, trials are run to gather feedback about the proposed work. The Psalms Advisory Committee is overseeing this process and the first trial will run for 7 weeks starting on Trinity Sunday. These psalms are being trialled during the Sunday Eucharist. Cathedral Close Paving: The Cathedral Council receives a Health and Safety report at each meeting. A current concern is the uneven paving in the Cathedral Close outside the John Dunn Room, caused by tree roots. This high-traffic area has already seen trips and falls, so action is needed. Options include: raising the ground level with infill and repaving; replacing the paving with a deck above root level; or removing the tree and incorporating new plantings and shade solutions in the repaving. The Council welcomes feedback from the Cathedral community. Please speak to a Council member or email office@stpeters-cathedral.org.au.

Winter Clothing Appeal: With the onset of cold weather there is a pressing need in the community for warm clothing for those who are sleeping rough or cannot afford to heat their homes or places of shelter. There is a particular need for larger sized men's jumpers, sweaters and jackets. If you have any items which are in good repair and are no longer needed, they would be much appreciated. Items may be left at the back of the Cathedral (near the food baskets) or at the Cathedral Office.

De-escalation Workshop: It is in the nature of a building like the Cathedral that some people who are troubled in mind, body or spirit come to us, often seeking help, but sometimes to vent their frustration and anger. TODAY at 12 noon, Peter Burdon and Gerald Lipman will present a short training session on De-escalation, designed to help manage and resolve conflicts effectively, and to keep yourself and other safe. The workshop will be held in the Cathedral: all welcome.
