St Peter's Cathedral resides on the lands of the Kurna people. We give thanks for their ancestors and acknowledge the ongoing right and responsibility of their elders to care for this Country. We are committed to work and pray towards a more just settlement for all Indigenous people and pay our respect to First Nations people with us.

St Peter's Cathedral is a Christ-centred, sacramental, inclusive, thinking, mission-oriented faith community.

"To everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under heaven" (Ecclesiastes 3:1)

This passage from the wisdom literature of the bible is one of the best known and best loved passages in the Old Testament.

One of the number of reasons for its appeal is that it speaks to our human condition. We all experience the ups and downs of life, our birth and our death, success and failure, times of joy and mourning, times of war and times of peace...

The writer of this poem tells us that there are things in life over which we have no control. God is sovereign. We are encouraged to rely on God's wisdom, God's timing and God's goodness.

We may not understand the mystery of life, but God has made everything beautiful in its time, and we are here to enjoy it. God calls us to "eat and drink and find satisfaction in our work- this is the gift of God" (Ecclesiastes 3:12)

THE SECOND LESSON

LUKE 8.40-56

The lesson from the Holy Gospel according to Luke, chapter 8, beginning at verse 40.

Now when Jesus returned *from the country of the Gerasenes*, the crowd welcomed him, for they were all waiting for him. Just then there came a man named Jairus, a leader of the synagogue. He fell at Jesus' feet and begged him to come to his house, for he had an only daughter, about twelve years old, who was dying.

As he went, the crowds pressed in on him. Now there was a woman who had been suffering from haemorrhages for twelve years; and though she had spent all she had on physicians, no one could cure her. She came up behind him and touched the fringe of his clothes, and immediately her haemorrhage stopped. Then Jesus asked, 'Who touched me?' When all denied it, Peter said, 'Master, the crowds surround you and press in on you.' But Jesus said, 'Someone touched me; for I noticed that power had gone out from me.' When the woman saw that she could not remain hidden, she came trembling; and falling down before him, she declared in the presence of all the people why she had touched him, and how she had been immediately healed. He said to her, 'Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace.'

While he was still speaking, someone came from the leader's house to say, 'Your daughter is dead; do not trouble the teacher any longer.' When Jesus heard this, he replied, 'Do not fear. Only believe, and she will be saved.' When he came to the house, he did not allow anyone to enter with him, except Peter, John, and James, and the child's father and mother. They were all weeping and wailing for her; but he said, 'Do not weep; for she is not dead but sleeping.' And they laughed at him, knowing that she was dead. But he took her by the hand and called out, 'Child, get up!' Her spirit returned, and she got up at once. Then he directed them to give her something to eat. Her parents were astounded; but he ordered them to tell no one what had happened.

A New Psalter 2025 Trial

In 2017, General Synod passed a motion asking the Liturgy Commission to develop a new liturgical psalter. This project was proposed by Rev'd Associate Professor Matthew Anstey, an internationally recognised Biblical Hebrew scholar and parish priest at St Theodore's, Toorak Gardens. Matthew began the translation in 2023 but the Liturgy Commission ceased oversight later that year, so Matthew gathered an Advisory Committee (of which Kathy Teague is a member) to provide advice and support for the project. The first trial of 10 psalms will run for 7 weeks starting on Trinity Sunday 2025. These psalms are being trialled here during the Sunday Eucharist.
