THE COLLECT OF THE DAY

O GOD, the strength of all them that put their trust in thee, mercifully accept our prayers; and because through the weakness of our mortal nature we can do no good thing without thee, grant us the help of thy grace, that in keeping of thy commandments we may please thee, both in will and deed; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen**.

FIRST READING

1 KINGS 19.1–4, 8–15A

A reading from the first book of Kings.

Ahab told Jezebel all that Elijah had done, and how he had killed all the prophets with the sword. Then Jezebel sent a messenger to Elijah, saying, 'So may the gods do to me, and more also, if I do not make your life like the life of one of them by this time tomorrow.' Then he was afraid; he got up and fled for his life, and came to Beer-sheba, which belongs to Judah; he left his servant there.

But he himself went a day's journey into the wilderness, and came and sat down under a solitary broom tree. He asked that he might die: 'It is enough; now, O Lord, take away my life, for I am no better than my ancestors.'

He got up, and ate and drank; then he went in the strength of that food for forty days and forty nights to Horeb the mount of God. At that place he came to a cave, and spent the night there.

Then the word of the Lord came to him, saying, 'What are you doing here, Elijah?' He answered, 'I have been very zealous for the Lord, the God of hosts; for the Israelites have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and killed your prophets with the sword. I alone am left, and they are seeking my life, to take it away.'

He said, 'Go out and stand on the mountain before the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by.' Now there was a great wind, so strong that it was splitting mountains and breaking rocks in pieces before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire a sound of sheer silence. When Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his mantle and went out and stood at the entrance of the cave. Then there came a voice to him that said, 'What are you doing here, Elijah?' He answered, 'I have been very zealous for the Lord, the God of hosts; for the Israelites have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and killed your prophets with the sword. I alone am left, and they are seeking my life, to take it away.' Then the Lord said to him, 'Go, return on your way to the wilderness of Damascus.

Hear the word of the Lord, **Thanks be to God.**

PSALM 42

Please respond with the words in bold type.

As the deer longs for streams of water: so longs my soul for you, O God. My soul thirsts for God, for the living God: when shall I appear before your face? My tears feed me by day and by night: ever saying to me, 'Where is your God?' Let me pour out my heart in remembrance: how I led the festive crowd to the house of God with joyful songs of praise. Why are you downcast, O my soul, troubled within me?: hope in God, for I shall yet praise his saving presence. My soul is heavy within me, my God: as I remember you from the land of Jordan and Hermon, from the mountain of Mizar. Deep calls to deep at the sound of your waters: all your crashing waves have swept over me. By day the Lord ordains his mercy and his song is with me by night: a prayer to the God of my life. Let me say to God, my rock, 'Why have you forgotten me?: why must I walk in darkness, oppressed by an enemy?" With death in my bones, my foes taunted me: ever saying to me, 'Where is your God?' Why are you downcast, O my soul? why are you troubled within me?: hope in God, for I shall yet praise him, my saving presence and my God.

PSALM 43

Vindicate me, O God, and defend my cause against a disloyal people: from the deceitful and unjust deliver me. You are the God of my refuge, so why have you abandoned me?: why must I wander about in darkness, oppressed by an enemy? Send out your light and your truth, let them lead me: let them guide me to your holy hill, your dwelling place. Let me go to the altar of God, to the God of my joyful rejoicing: let me praise you with the harp, O God, my God. Why are you downcast, O my soul? why are you troubled within me?: hope in God, for I shall yet praise him, my saving presence and my God.

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SECOND READING

GALATIANS 3.10-14; 23-29

A reading from the letter of Paul to the Galatians.

For all who rely on the works of the law are under a curse; for it is written, 'Cursed is everyone who does not observe and obey all the things written in the book of the law.' Now it is evident that no one is justified before God by the law; for 'The one who is righteous will live by faith.' But the law does not rest on faith; on the contrary, 'Whoever does the works of the law will live by them.' Christ redeemed us from the curse of the law by becoming a curse for us—for it is written, 'Cursed is everyone who hangs on a tree'— in order that in Christ Jesus the blessing of Abraham might come to the Gentiles, so that we might receive the promise of the Spirit through faith.

Now before faith came, we were imprisoned and guarded under the law until faith would be revealed. Therefore the law was our disciplinarian until Christ came, so that we might be justified by faith. But now that faith has come, we are no longer subject to a disciplinarian, for in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith. As many of you as were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus. And if you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's offspring, heirs according to the promise.

THE GOSPEL

LUKE 8:26-39

The Lord be with you.

And with thy spirit.


The Holy Gospel is written in the 8th Chapter of the Gospel according to Luke, beginning at verse 26.

Glory be to thee, O Lord.

Jesus and his disciples arrived at the country of the Gerasenes, which is opposite Galilee. As he stepped out on land, a man of the city who had demons met him. For a long time he had worn no clothes, and he did not live in a house but in the tombs. When he saw Jesus, he fell down before him and shouted at the top of his voice, 'What have you to do with me, Jesus, Son of the Most High God? I beg you, do not torment me'— for Jesus had commanded the unclean spirit to come out of the man. (For many times it had seized him; he was kept under guard and bound with chains and shackles, but he would break the bonds and be driven by the demon into the wilds.) Jesus then asked him, 'What is your name?' He said, 'Legion'; for many demons had entered him. They begged him not to order them to go back into the abyss. Now there on the hillside a large herd of swine was feeding; and the demons begged Jesus to let them enter these. So he gave them permission. Then the demons came out of the man and entered the swine, and the herd rushed down the steep bank into the lake and was drowned.

When the swineherds saw what had happened, they ran off and told it in the city and in the country. Then people came out to see what had happened, and when they came to Jesus, they found the man from whom the demons had gone sitting at the feet of Jesus, clothed and in his right mind. And they were afraid. Those who had seen it told them how the one who had been possessed by demons had been healed. Then all the people of the surrounding country of the Gerasenes asked Jesus to leave them; for they were seized with great fear. So he got into the boat and returned. The man from whom the demons had gone begged that he might be with him; but Jesus sent him away, saying, 'Return to your home, and declare how much God has done for you.' So he went away, proclaiming throughout the city how much Jesus had done for him.

This is the Gospel of the Lord. Praise be to thee, O Christ.

A New Psalter 2025 Trial

In 2017, General Synod passed a motion asking the Liturgy Commission to develop a new liturgical psalter. This project was proposed by Rev'd Associate Professor Matthew Anstey, an internationally recognised Biblical Hebrew scholar and parish priest at St Theodore's, Toorak Gardens. Matthew began the translation in 2023 but the Liturgy Commission ceased oversight later that year, so Matthew gathered an Advisory Committee (of which Kathy Teague is a member) to provide advice and support for the project. The first trial of 10 psalms will run for 7 weeks starting on Trinity Sunday 2025. These psalms are being trialled here during the Sunday Eucharist.
