Centenary of Armistice

The "war to end all wars" was the way the "Great War 1914 - 1918" was described. Sadly it was not to be and the 2nd World War 1939 - 1945 followed (with subsequent renaming of the "Great" to the "1st World War").

Today, Remembrance Day 2018, we unveil and bless a plaque on the Memorial Cross to commemorate the centenary of the signing of the Armistice in 1918. It serves to remind us that peace for the world remains an elusive concept. Sadly the past hundred years has seen the use of atomic warfare and the proliferation of indiscriminate terrorist action, often claiming dozens of civilian lives.

The number of displaced people in the world has never been higher. By the end of last year, according to a recent UNHCR report, there were 68.5 million forcibly displaced people in the world, including 25.4 million refugees.

South Australian Defence personnel continue to serve with United Nations and other international groupings in the Middle East, Africa and Asia.

We will remember.




Merciful God, we thank you for these gifts of your creation, this bread and wine,

you. Do this in remembrance of me.'


After supper, he took the cup, and again giving you thanks he gave it to his


