The Fourth Sunday after Epiphany

Welcome

A new year begins as we return from holidays, choir tours and family 'chill-out' time. With it we welcome two new members of the Cathedral Staff - The Rev'd Peter Jin, Assistant Curate and Anthony (Ant) Hunt, Director of Music. Today we also celebrate with some of our Diocese's long-serving clergy as they mark the 40th anniversary of their ordinations on the Feast of the Presentation in 1980. Welcome too to those who are new to Adelaide and the Cathedral. (Please take a moment to complete a green Connect card.)

All four of this morning's readings suggest that the way of the world is not necessarily that of God. The searing call of the prophet Micah exhorts us to do justice, love kindness and walk humbly with God; the psalmist reminds us to live an 'uncorrupt life'; St Paul talks about the cross as foolishness and a stumbling block; while Jesus utters the beautiful but challenging words known as the Beatitudes. And all on a day when we recall how the baby Jesus was presented in the Temple and recognized by a very old man as the 'Light to the nations'.

Welcome to all who come into God's holy space as God's holy people.

Please sit for the first reading: Micah 6:1-8 (read by Audrey Mitchell)

Hear what the Lord says: Rise, plead your case before the mountains, and let the hills hear your voice. ² Hear, you mountains, the controversy of the Lord, and you enduring foundations of the earth; for the Lord has a controversy with his people, and he will contend with Israel. ³ 'O my people, what have I done to you? In what have I wearied you? Answer me! ⁴ For I brought you up from the land of Egypt, and redeemed you from the house of slavery; and I sent before you Moses, Aaron, and Miriam. ⁵ O my people, remember now what King Balak of Moab devised, what Balaam son of Beor answered him, and what happened from Shittim to Gilgal, that you may know the saving acts of the Lord.' ⁶ 'With what shall I come before the Lord, and bow myself before God on high? Shall I come before him with burnt-offerings, with calves a year old? ⁷ Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams, with tens of thousands of rivers of oil? Shall I give my firstborn for my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?' ⁸ He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?

Hear the word of the Lord, **thanks be to God.**

Lord, who may abide in your tabernacle: or who may dwell upon your holy hill?
Whoever leads an uncorrupt life and does the thing which is right:
 who speaks the truth from the heart, and has not slandered with the tongue;
Who has done no evil to a friend: nor vented abuse against a neighbour;
In whose eyes the worthless have no honour:
 but who makes much of those that fear the Lord;
Whoever has sworn to a neighbour: and will not go back on that oath;
Who has not put money to usury: nor taken a bribe against the innocent.
Whoever does these things: shall never be overthrown.

Second reading: 1 Corinthians 1:18-31 (read by Stephen Matthew)

For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. ¹⁹ For it is written, 'I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart.' ²⁰ Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? ²¹ For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe.

¹² Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you.

Let us together affirm the faith of the Church.

We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven, was incarnate of the Holy Spirit and the virgin Mary and became truly human. 

Gluten free bread is available; please ask for this from the priest giving communion.
