Welcome: We're nearly halfway through Lent already. How are you travelling on this journey? Two Lent courses are going well, a few more people are attending weekday early morning Eucharists, and, in the Cathedral Office, our attention is already focusing on preparing service books for Holy Week and Easter. Part of my own particular Lenten discipline is to have to write my report for the annual Vestry Meeting on Sunday 21 March. This year that means looking back over the past eight and more years during which I have been Dean.

Today's Gospel passage of Jesus cleansing the temple is always a challenge to a large, beautiful Cathedral which is used for many different purposes. How do we keep the holy and sacred while using it well, both for worship and concerts, exhibitions and so on? One of the things that keeps it holy is to encourage people to pray – and for that we need a ready source of Welcomers to keep the doors open. Cathedrals have always been meeting places – not just for the super religious, but for the community at large. A good example of this is this week's Commonwealth Day Service – a multi-faith venture open to all.

Welcome to you as we come together today to worship and pray.

The Collect for the Third Sunday in Lent

Lord our God, by your Holy Spirit write your commandments upon our hearts and grant us the wisdom and power of the cross, so that, cleansed from greed and selfishness, we may become a living temple of your love; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

The Collect for Ash Wednesday

Almighty and everlasting God, you hate nothing that you have made, and you forgive the sins of all who are penitent: create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we, worthily lamenting our sins, and acknowledging our wretchedness, may obtain of you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness; through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Then God spoke all these words: ² I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; ³ you shall have no other gods before me. ⁴ You shall not make for yourself an idol, whether in the form of anything that is in heaven above, or that is on the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. ⁵ You shall not bow down to them or worship them; for I the Lord your God am a jealous God, punishing children for the iniquity of parents, to the third and the fourth generation of those who reject me, ⁶ but showing steadfast love to the thousandth generation of those who love me and keep my commandments. ⁷ You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the Lord your God, for the Lord will not acquit anyone who misuses his name.

For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. ¹⁹ For it is written,
'I will destroy the wisdom of the wise,
and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart.'

²⁰ Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? ²¹ For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. ²² For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, ²³ but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling-block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, ²⁴ but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. ²⁵ For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.
