Welcome:

In this morning's reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah, God speaks about the power of the "word" of God: "my word that goes out from my mouth shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose and succeed in the thing for which I sent it," God says.

In Chapter 6 of Luke's Gospel, we hear Jesus speaking to his disciples, challenging his disciples about the way of faith. Jesus uses parables to give insight into those who are unwise in the ways of God. We might wonder how these "words" from Jesus will accomplish their purpose. We are often encouraged to sit with parables and allow them to irritate us, to amuse us, perhaps. May we find that Jesus' words shed light on our own struggles to live as faithful children of God.





He also told them a parable: 'Can a blind person guide a blind person? Will not both fall into a pit? A disciple is not above the teacher, but everyone who is fully qualified will be like the teacher. Why do you see the speck in your neighbour's eye, but do not notice the log in your own eye? Or how can you say to your neighbour, "Friend, let me take out the speck in your eye", when you yourself do not see the log in your own eye? You hypocrite, first take the log out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to take the speck out of your neighbour's eye. 'No good tree bears bad fruit, nor again does a bad tree bear good fruit; for each tree is known by its own fruit. Figs are not gathered from thorns, nor are grapes picked from a bramble bush. The good person out of the good treasure of the heart produces good, and the evil person out of evil treasure produces evil; for it is out of the abundance of the heart that the mouth speaks. 'Why do you call me "Lord, Lord", and do not do what I tell you? I will show you what someone is like who comes to me, hears my words, and acts on them. That one is like a man building a house, who dug deeply and laid the foundation on rock; when a flood arose, the river burst against that house but could not shake it, because it had been well built. But the one who hears and does not act is like a man who built a house on the ground without a foundation. When the river burst against it, immediately it fell, and great was the ruin of that house.'


